

BELOVED WOMAN PASSES TO THE GREAT BEYOND

About 1:30 o'clock Thursday afternoon, February 23, the spirit of Miss Fannie Ramage passed to the great beyond. This news brings sadness to the entire community as Miss Ramage was dearly beloved by hosts of friends. She lingered on the brink of eternity for a week or more and each day brought anxious inquiries from interested friends.

Miss Ramage had reached the advanced age of 73 years and is survived by only one brother, the Rev. Bartow Bee Ramage, who, with his wife, arrived several weeks ago from their home in Memphis, Tenn., to be at the bedside of his sister.

The funeral services were held Friday afternoon at three o'clock from the First Baptist church, the Rev. E. V. Babb conducting the services. Three hymns were sung, a Resurrection song by the choir, "Asleep in Jesus," and "Abide With Me." Scripture reading and a prayer of praise for the life of this Christian woman, made up the simple but impressive service. The interment was held at the family burying ground about three miles from town. The pallbearers were: Messrs. J. T. Mayes, J. N. McCaughrin, F. N. Martin, W. F. Ewart, J. M. Johnstone, I. H. Hunt and R. G. Wallace, Sr.

Masses of beautiful blossoms covered the mound of this sainted woman—mute testimonials of love and devotion from many friends.

Prof. and Mrs. Burr H. Johnstone of Clemson College who formerly had been neighbors of Miss Ramage, were present at the funeral of their friend.

Miss Ramage was a faithful member of the First Baptist church of Newberry, being a regular attendant at all the church services and taking an active part in the Sunday school and in the mission work of the church. Her religion was not one of theory alone, but of practical Christianity. The noble qualities in the character of this lovely Christian woman can not be measured by mere words. The daily acts of kindness which she performed—the years of usefulness which she lived—will be unto her a living memorial. Her life was a benediction to all who knew her.

It is hard to realize that "Miss Fannie" has gone. It seems such a short while since she met and mingled with friends and strangers—with a friendly clasp of the hand and a cheery smile. The sunshine from her beautiful life radiated upon all those with whom she came in contact and she made life seem the more worth living.

Yet in her death, there is a sweetness in the sadness—a joy in the sorrow—because for her there can only be joy in the hereafter—the fulfillment of the glorious promises of God for those who live for Him. H. C. W.

The xylophone and piano combination won particular favor.

Aside from the instrumental and vocal numbers, readings were given. Just enough wit was interspersed into the evening to give the sparkling touch. There was not a slow number in it.

Such programs can not but have the most elevating effect on the younger boys and girls of the colored population and the committee bringing the company here is to be congratulated. The house which greeted the company filled the large auditorium to its capacity, among those present being more than a hundred white people.
