For instance, the largest single item originally claimed as a saving was \$15,000,000 out of the pension fund. Because the pension bureau was behind with its work it was estimated ·thi samount would not be spent before July 1. But the bureau caught up with its work to some extent and under date of March 2 advised me that they would spend all but \$6,000,-, 000. If h force becomes more efficient in preparing the pending cases this alleged saving will be still further reduced. Even if not spent by July 1 the fund remains available and whenever the cases growing out of the Spanish-American war act are decided, the pension dates back to the day the application was filed, and the money will be spent. General Dawes would have us believe that the less efficient the force is in investigating the cases the less money will be spent but he si mistaken.

Judge Bowman Gives Sentence to Corbett-Former Supt. of Education to Face Charge

Orangeburg, May 8:- Carlos Corbett was sentenced to serve 18 years in the state penitentiary today by Judge I. W. Bowman, who is presiding over the Orangeburg court. Corbett was found guilty of manslaughter when called to trial for the murder of Julian Copoer. In September 1920, when he was tried for the murder of Bryan Salley, one of the slain men, he was acquitted. An appeal will be taken to the supreme court. Corbett is now in the Orangeburg jail and his wife has returned to her home in Hartsville. .

THREE MEN **CONFESS MURDER**

MURDER OF ARNETTE COMMIT-ED BY THREE COLUMBIANS

Body Found in Front of Automobile Near Bay Branch Bridge in North Columbia

Columbia, May 10 .- Confessions by F. M. Jeffords, Ira Harrison and Glenn Treece, the three men held for the murder of J. C. Arnette, proprietor of the Elmwood filling station, at Main street and Elmwood avenue, were sensational developments today in the situation surrounding the murder of the well-known Columbian during Tuesday night. Officers refused to disclose the nature of the confessions, but a general statement covering the plot was said to have resulted in the death of Jefford's partner, was made, to the effect that the trio had made admissions that gave substantial form to the theory that by the death of Arnette, Jeffords would have come into possession of the sole ownership in the business; and that Harrison and Treece would have been awarded for their part in the crime by being given an interest in the bus-

iness. The information that something inusual had happened during the evening reached Sheriff Heise and Deputy Sheriff Thompson at about 11 o'clock when Jack Dent informed them that a dead body had been found near the Bay Branch bridge, on Kirkland avenue in North Columbia. Possibility of foul play was the theory advanced by Dent from the hasty examination that he had made of the scene, he told the officers. The body was found lying in front of an automobile which had been driven down the embankment. The officers felt the man's pulse but life was extinct, they thought. However, Dr. W. E. Fulmer was summoned, and confirmed their fears. Death had resulted from blows on the back of the head with some instrument. From the condition of the body had been brought to the lonely spot and held upright between two men.

JUDGE BEVERLY D. EVANS DIES SUDDENLY

Savannah, Ga., May 7.-Judge Beverly D. Evans, United States dishour to be annuonced later. Also trict judge for the southern district remember that absolutely nothing of Georgia, died suddenly at his home here tonight.

Death resulted from a heart atack.

Judge Evans was 57 years old. A graduate of Yale, practically his entire life from the time he left that institution was spent in practice of 'aw either on the bench or bar of his native state. He served as a memper of the Georgia legislature 1886-87 and was a delegate from Georgia to the democratic national convenion, 1888. Appointed a judge of the middle judicial circuit of Georgia he filled that office five years, becomng a justice of the state supreme court in 1904 and presiding justice n 1907. After thirteen years as head of the highest state tribunal, Judge Evans resigned to accept the federal judgeship which he held until nis death.

Judge Evans was taken ill at 4 'clock this afternoon and physicians were called and administered to him out he gradually grew worse and the end came at 8:30 p. m.

It was his third heart attack. Judge Evans was born at Sandersville, Ga., on May 21, 1865, and was rraduated from Mercer university in 1881. He was admitted to the bar of Georgia in 1884, when only 19 ied. He has four living sons, Thomas W. of Dublin, Ga.; Julian of Sanlersville, Ga.; George R. and Erwin L. Evans. Another son, Lieut. Beverly D. Evans, Jr., was killed in acion in France in 1918.
