Then it was that they remembered the circumstance and informed the owner, who, as soon as he could get ready, pursued the thief, who took the public road leading from this place in the direction of Sumter. We hear that the thief stopped at a gentleman's house a few miles from Kingstree and asked him to loan him a saddle for a short time, telling him that his brother had been shot and killed in Kingstree, and that he was in a hurry to inform his sister, who lived a short distance up the road. He got the saddle and the latest information of him, is that Burrows came up with him near Camden and shot at him, but he succeeded in escaping on the horse. Burrows is still in pursuit.
