THE CITY OF THE SAND HILLS. FULTON, S. C., October 10, 1887. A 2000.

There is, perhaps, no place in South Carolina containing such a wealth of timber as the Santee Swamp, and especially in north-western Clarendon.

There is literally a boom in the timber interests of Fulton, at present, and the sagacious of our citizens predict that soon this mine of wealth will be utilized. The largest lumber companies of northern cities have frequently sent their representatives out to inspect and negotiate for this territory. These gentlemen have candidly admitted its great value, but the head and front of the difficulty has been to decide upon the means of transportation, and the reluctance of speculators to invest the enormous amount necessary for the initiatory steps of manufacturing. Several plans were suggested, but none seemed to obviate the many disadvantages. On account of frequent freshets it is impossible to put the necessary machinery in the swamp, and as most of the timber will not float, the plan of rafting it down to the mouth of the river and there milling it is untenable.

Mr. Jordan, of the wealthy firm of Jordan, Reed & Macy, proposes a plan to surmount these difficulties, which is as unique as it seems practicable. It is to equip an immense boat with all the fixtures of a large saw mill, and launch it upon the river, plying up and down the stream at their own sweet will. Tram roads would be built all over the swamp which would haul the timber to the various moorings of the floating mill. The merchantable lumber would then be loaded upon large barges pulled by steam tugs to the mouth of the river, where the company intend building a mammoth wharf. Here vessels will be waiting to receive and carry it to market. Of course during the inundation of the swamp the tramway would have to be abandoned until the water subsided. The floating mill, however, could not be effected by the caprices of high or low water.

Mr. Jordan is making a tour of the entire swamp, and will reach lower Clarendon this week. He has made some lugh "deals" in timber lands in Kershaw and Richland counties. It is also hinted that one of the most extensive land owners here, has made a sale of 6,000 acres. Mr. Jordan is one of the most affable and refined gentlemen I have ever met; his terms are much more liberal than any offered hitherto, and if the timber owners dispose of their interests to any one, I predict that Mr. Jordan's company will control it. They are not a coterie of Eassey's, however, who will sell their birth right for a mess of pottage. Mr. Jordan hopes to perfect his arrangements within the next sixty days, and put 1,000 men at work. Verily, there is a boom.

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Only a Sensation. John S. Nettles, the colored barber of Sumter who entered the room of a lady in that town sometime ago and who was brought to the Richland jail for safe keeping was yesterday turned over to Sheriff Sanders and, by him, taken before Chief Justice Simpson. Hon. Marion Meise instituted habeas

corpus proceedings for his release on bail, which was granted in the sum of \$500. Nettles was set at liberty on his own recognizance, to appear at Court in Sumter on Monday next. —Columbian Record.

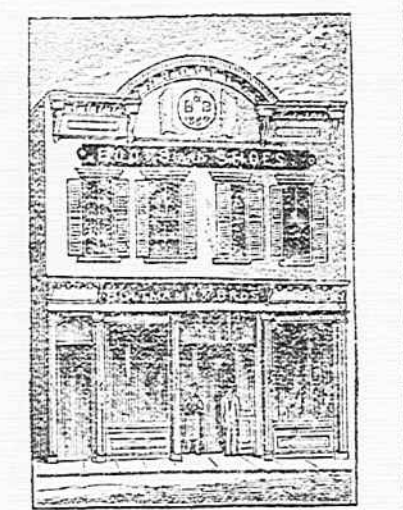
