Take the last two figures of the year, add a quarter of this, disregarding the fraction add the date of the month and to this add the figure in the following list, one figure standing for each month: 3-6-6-2-4-0-2-5-1-3 6-1. Divide the sum by seven and the remainder will give the number of the day in the week, and when there is no remainder the day will be Saturday. As an example take March 19, 1890. Take 90, add 22, add 19, add 6. This gives 137, which divided by 7 leaves a remainder of 4, which is the number of the day, or Wednesday.


