### A Venture of Voodoism in Sumter. No sooner had the excitement over the killing of Hurst begun to subside than the

community was again aroused by news of the killing of a negro named Primus Jones at Beulah colored church on the Bell Mill place, owned by Mr. Toumey. It seems that quite a protracted religious meeting was being carried on among the colored folks, and the greatest sort of excitement prevailed. The whole plantation nearly went crazy. The news at first was that Primus had been offered up as a sacrifice to the Holy Ghost because of his incredulity. On Sunday last Deputy Coroner S. A. Norris held the inquest at the church. The testimony showed that in a perfect frenzy of fanaticism the deceased was killed by Rev. A. H. DuRant, the colored pastor, and one Richard Campbell, a prominent member of the church, because the deceased had expressed his doubts about the supernaturai power of the said minister to kill and restore to life, and this was to be a test case, but the experiment failed. This is perhaps the clearest case of voodoism that has ever occurred in our county. A large number of DuRant's congregation believed until his failure in this case, that he posessed super-natural power. 
