

HURRAH FOR CLARENDON! We have always found Clarendon true to her colors and to her duty, and when several weeks before the election we were asked by the State Democratic Executive Committee what majority Clarendon would give, we replied: "The people of Clarendon know how to appreciate a Democratic government, and while we have a white vote of only about 1500, yet we will give you a Democratic majority of 10,000. We raised it by only 35 votes. The majority is 965.

THAT ELECTION AT PINWOOD. Mr. J. M. Welch of Fulton, has undertaken to represent Gen. Earle in regard to the election of Gen. Earle's advice to the persons who held registration certificates for Fulton and who wanted to vote at Pinewood. He says Gen. Earle bases his opinion on an act of the Legislature passed in 1855. Our lawyers based their opinion on an act passed in 1889, just four years later. But we don't propose discussing law on our own hook, especially with Mr. Welch. We have the opinion of two lawyers on this question, and they after having fully studied the matter advised us that voters registered for Fulton could not vote at Pinewood. That lets Mr. Welch out, unless he can get the law from Mr. Earle or from some other township. We therefore drop the subject on that point.

We are not familiar with the geography of Pinewood. We are told it is very near the line. The postoffice and most of the houses are in Calvary township and not in Fulton. The State election was held in Calvary township and not in Fulton. So say a number of reliable gentlemen who live at and near Pinewood. Our remarks were based on what these gentlemen told us, and we believe them to be honorable gentlemen. There is not a more honest man in the county than Louis H. Des-Champs. He and others say Pinewood is about four miles from Fulton and is principally in Calvary township.

Mr. Welch says he is a member of the county Democratic executive committee, but was not consulted when the instructions were issued to the Democratic managers at Pinewood not to allow voters registered for Fulton to vote at Pinewood. We are aware of this fact, and it was his fault that he was not present. The meeting was held in pursuance of a call of the executive committee itself. Mr. Welch never attended that meeting, and that was last August. But, by way of parenthesis, we beg leave to differ from Mr. Welch on his claim to present membership of the Democratic executive committee. We are informed he supported the recent Independent ticket, and if so we are confident that from his sense of the fitness of things he will not attempt to claim any privileges from the county Democracy. And, another parenthesis, no man has for the past month been recognized as a member of the county Democratic executive committee unless he pledged his allegiance to the regular Democratic party, and no man of whose fealty there was the slightest doubt attempted to be present at any of our meetings.

It may not be amiss to state that the Pinewood box was thrown out by the commissioners of election.

We have got all in politics we could have asked for. The county, State, and nation has gone Democratic. Let the same continue two years hence with a Democratic president added, and the people will indeed be happy.
