Goff's Infamy Stamped Out.

The United States Court of Appeals, composed of Chief Justice Fuller, Judges Hughes and Seymour, filed their decision in the registration cases yesterday. This Court after reviewing Judge Goff's decision at Columbia decided that a court of equity has no jurisdiction in matters political, and they dissolved Goff's infamous injunction. The effect of the decision is that every man must be provided with a registration certificate before he can vote just as the laws of South Carolina have required ever since 1882. This will knock into a cocked hat any attempt at an appeal to the negro, and the supremacy of the white man is assured. 
