

the clerk, and the clerk may in turn ad-minister the same oaths to the chairman. The said oaths may be administered by any other officer authorized to administer oaths, and shall be filed in the office of the clerk of Court of Common Pleas and General Sessions. The voting shall be by ballet, which baliot shall be of plain white paper two and

a half inches wide by five inches long, clear and even cut, without ornament, deption, mutilation, symbol, erasure, or mark of any kind whatsoever except the names of the persons voted for, which names shall be written or printed, or partly written or partly printed, and if printed, in black ink, and such ballot shall be folded so as to conceal the name or names thereon, and so tolded shall be deposited in a box to be constructed, kept and disposed of as hereinafter provided, and no ballot of any other description found in any ballot-box shall be counted.

At each precinct a space or inclosure, such as the managers deem proper and sufficient, shall be railed off, or otherwise provided with an opening for the entrance of the voter at one end or side, and an opening at the other and for his exit, as a polling place.
