### REGAINING LOST LAURELS.

Up Goes the Price of Cotton and the Farmer is Happy.

Cotton is struggling hard to regain his lost crown and from all sources of information it is agreed that the price will steadily advance. There will be some fluctuations, but it will only act as an incentive to struggle the harder and then go still higher. The government report comes out to-morrow, and a great shortage in the crop is expected to be announced; if so, look out for cotton to go bounding up, and no earthly power will stop it short of ten cents. The yield this year is about six millions of bales with no surplus in sight. The amount required to supply the demand is about ten millions. The manufacturers have contracts on which they are compelled to fill and the raw cotton must be had regardless of price. The farmers are surely "in it" this year, and if any class of people need a lift, it is them. We hope they will not in their present prosperity forget the lessons of economy forced upon them in the past.


