

Low Temperatures. Some recent results in French chemical experience have attracted considerable attention from the fact that by new methods a temperature has been obtained far lower than grees C. below zero or 491 degrees F. below the freezing point of water. This temperature was obtained, it seems, by using a series of cold wells plan. In the first of these wells In this cold well was then immersed densed and thus reached 150 degrees below zero. In another well 210 degrees was marked and again 273 degrees. In the case of these last ide, marsh gas and atmospheric air under pressure of 40 atmospheres were employed, and the instruments with which measurement of the lower temperatures were made consisted of hydrogen thermometers graduated by comparison with the sulphuric ether instruments. 
