All privies, vaults, sinks and water closets in the town limits must be cleaned by May 1st 1896, and the Town Council shall so order.

 Richmond, Va., March 25, 1896.
 To the United Confederate Veterans Everywhere:

Your Sixth Annual Reunion will be held at Richmond, Virginia, on the 30th June, 1st and 2d days of July next.

Widely scattered since the war by the ties of family and old-time friendships, by the demands of business, by your natural energies, and by the necessities of life, you are coming home—home to the city which is yours by the supreme tests of the rain of fire through which you went, and of the sea of blood through which you passed, on the missions of her and the common defence. You have been no prodigal sons, for you inherited only the remnants of a rapacious ravage that was rampant everywhere in your land; because you had nothing left but the manhood from which you were inseparable. But the fatted calf shall be killed for you, and we shall be merry together, not because of pity for your sins, but because pride in your fame demands.

You shall traverse again the streets which thrilled to the trend of your legions while they were passing to the ranks of the best army that the world ever knew.

You shall be confronted by the Virginians who were the comrades of your immortal glory and who are your brothers forever.

You shall see again the women who nursed you back to vigor from the feebleness of wounds and want, from the wretched woe of your losses, and who watched the dying gaze of your fellows to the heaven which stooped to enfold them.

Your eyes shall behold for themselves the city which proudly wrapped herself in your patriotic flames, from which she has emerged a thing of beauty and a joy for all.

You shall revisit the battlefields which have been consecrated by your blood, and where, if you lost your country, you found a fame that fills the world.

Heartily helped by our city and her citizens, we are building for you a place for reunion in which ten thousand of you may make the welkin ring to the music of Dixie and to the chorus of the rebel yell.

On some appropriate day of the reunion you shall be part and parcel of the rearing of that monument which shall be to Jefferson Davis, not merely because he was your President and dwelt as such in the capital of your Confederacy; but because he was the unspokeable type of that ineffable manhood which made the armies of the South.

Daring your stay here there will be many a bygone, where, not in bravado disloyalty, but for sweet memory's sake, will be sung over again the old songs, told over again the old tales, fought over the old fights, yelled again the old yell, and raised again the old flag.

NOTICE OF REGISTRATION Of Voters!
 OFFICE OF SUPERVISORS OF REGISTRATION FOR CLARENDON COUNTY.

THE BOOKS FOR THE REGISTRATION OF voters will be opened at the court house in Manning, Monday, April 6th, 1896, and continue open for six consecutive weeks.

All men citizens who have been residents of the State two years and their respective polling precincts for four months, and have paid their poll tax six months previous to an election, and are not laboring under any of the disabilities mentioned in the constitution, and who can read or understand the constitution, are qualified to register and become electors. The books will be again opened on the first Mondays in June, July, August and September and kept open one week in each month and thirty days before the general election the books will be closed; but citizens becoming of age during the interval and are not otherwise disqualified, may be registered before the books are closed.

All persons registered on or before January 1st, 1895, will be qualified voters for life unless they subsequently should be disqualified on account of other provisions of the constitution.
