

NOTICE

Federal Election.

AN ELECTION WILL BE HELD on Tuesday, the 3rd day of November, 1896, at the legally established polling precincts in Clarendon county, for a Representative of the 6th Congressional District of South Carolina, in the 55th Congress of the United States.

The polls will be opened at 7 o'clock a. m., and kept open without intermission or adjournment until 4 o'clock p. m.

At the close of the election the Managers shall immediately proceed to publicly count the ballots. Within three days thereafter the Chairman of the Board of Managers, or one of them, to be designated in writing by the Board, shall deliver to the Commissioners of Election the poll list, the boxes containing the ballots, and a written statement of the result of the election at his precinct.

The Managers of Election shall require of every elector offering to vote at such election, before allowing him to vote, in addition to the production of his registration certificate, proof of the payment of poll tax six months before said election of any poll tax then due and payable.

The Managers shall administer to each person offering to vote, an oath that he is qualified to vote at said election, according to the constitution of the State, and that he has not already voted in said election.

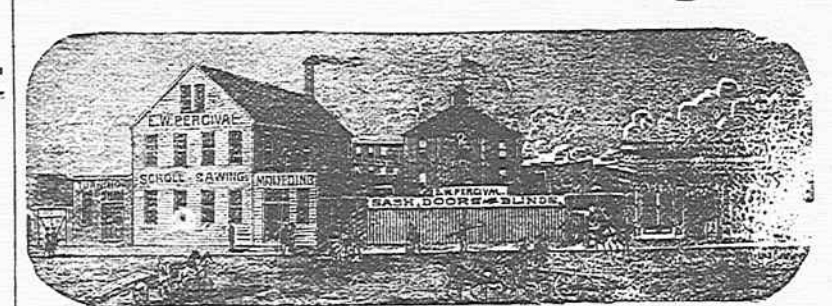
