Some Timely Remarks on an Oft-Repeated Request,

The city editor of a newspaper nearly every day is importuned to leave this piece of news or that piece of news out of the paper, and duty to the public, as well as to his paper, often requires him to refuse such requests, while personally he might like to comply with them.

The Augusta "Chronicle" has an editorial
