CHARLESTON, Nov. 1.—The committee on ways and means of the city council met and considered the petition submitted to council last Tuesday from the commercial organizations and merchants urging an appropriation of \$5,000 for the arrest and conviction of the party or parties who recently set fire to the steamships Idar and Rotherfield.

Application was made to Judge Simonton by James Boyd and others for a receiver for the Southern Pine Fiber company of Aiken county. The company was incorporated under the laws of the state of New Jersey, but last spring the charter was declared null and void by the legislature of New Jersey, and the complainants now wish a receiver appointed to settle up the affairs of the defunct corporation.

COTTON MEN IN CAROLINA. Association of New England Manufacturers Spends a Day at Asheville.

ASHEVILLE, N. C., Nov. 1.—President R. W. Eaton of the New England Cotton Manufacturers' association, accompanied by 35 members of the organization, spent the day in this city looking over its advantages from a manufacturing standpoint.

The party is traveling through southern territory by invitation of the Southern railway. They will visit Spartanburg, Greenville, Columbia and other points in South Carolina, and Charlotte, Concord and other towns in North Carolina.

These manufacturers are looking over the territory with a view of removing their plants from New England to the south, or of engaging in the cotton mill business here independent of their northern holdings.

SAILANT UNDER ARREST. Black Brute Who Assaulted Miss Cole Is Now Behind the Bars.

ROCKINGHAM, N. C., Nov. 1.—A ne- gro was arrested at Lilesville who has been identified by a sister of Miss Lillie Cole as the brute who assaulted her on Oct. 23. He is about 21 years of age, of dark color and about 5 1/2 feet high. He admits being in Rockingham that night.

On the morning of the assault this ne- gro came into Captain Everette's store with dirt on his hat and clothes and told Mr. Taylor, the clerk, to brush, with which to brush away the dirt.

After learning of the outrage, Mr. Taylor at once suspected this negro, but others thought differently. Later others began to think as he did, and this led to his arrest at Lilesville.

After the arrest Mr. Taylor was sent over to identify him as the same man who called for the brush on the twenty-third. This he found no difficulty in doing. The prisoner was brought to Rockingham, and Mayor Everett had the sister—the only one who could identify the culprit—in the waiting room at the depot on the arrival of the train, which only stopped a few moments.

The prisoner was quickly carried into the presence of the young lady, who at once recognized him as the fiend who assaulted her sister. The prisoner was immediately taken back to the train and sent to Raleigh for safe keeping.

ALL TEAMS MAY DISBAND. Von Gammon's Death Likely to Kill the Game in the South—Victim Barred.

ATLANTA, Nov. 1.—As a result of the fatal injuries received by Von Gammon, one of the most popular members of the football team of the University of Georgia, in the game here Saturday between that team and Virginia, the Georgia team will no doubt disband.

Four of the members composing the team have announced their intention of drawing out and stated positively that they would never enter another foot- ball game during the rest of their lives. This will not only end the sport at the Athens university, but will, it is safe to say, cause the total abolition of the game in this state.

Young Gammon, who died from his injuries at the Grady hospital here, was buried at Rome. The services were conducted from the First Presbyterian church of that city, and were beautiful and impressive, the whole of the university being present to witness the sad rites over their dead comrade. The floral offerings were very elaborate.

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The committee decided favorably upon the petition and Mayor Smyth has issued a proclamation to that effect.

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
