The Greenville News and other anti-dispensary newspapers seem very impatient to get a declaration from Goveror Ellerbe, as to his course with reference to the dispensary, and from day to day they are throwing out hints of a deal made by the Governor to recommend local option. We do not know whether there is any ground to suspect that governor Ellerbe has changed his views about the handling of the liquor problem, but we have no idea that by word or act has he ever given any man good resson to believe that he will not stand to the declarations made upon the hustings, when he went before the people asking for re-election. The people endorsed him in spite of the combinations and alliances made to defeat him, and now that the battle is won, to turn around and recommend for the enactment into law, a measure which was rejected by the voters in the recent campaign would be absurd. The exceedingly low price of cot-Tillman and Schumpert went from county to county and tried to prove that local option was the panacea for all of their ills, but they would have it

their falacious doctrine. We gave to Governor Ellerbe our hearty support and we did so, upon his manly stand for what he thought was right without regard to political consequences; had he been a trimmer the prohibitionist would not have given him opposition because he would have, on the dead quiet, given them to understand that he was with them.
