Hon. R. O. Purdy of Sumter is a candidate for the Legislature in that county with a fine prospect of election. He spoke at the campaign meeting in Sumter and expressed the following sentiments: "As to the liquor question, he had never belonged to any temperance organization other than the Methodist church, and this was as good a temperance organization as could be had. If its doctrines were lived up to, if a check-out prohibition measure were introduced in the Legislature he would support it with all his heart and soul. He did not believe in passing any crazy patchwork scheme. (Dr. John H. Purman here asked Mr. Purdy if he favored local option, to which he replied that he did not.) Mr. Purdy went on to say that the comparison between the dispensary and the bar-rooms is as between daylight and dark. Consumption of liquor has been greatly decreased by the operation of the dispensary, and nothing better presented itself he would support it."

Tuesday the 28th day of August, is the day set aside by the constitution of the Democratic party for the primary election, and it is very important for every Democrat to go out to his club and cast his vote. The only qualification necessary to vote in the primary is to be enrolled upon the club in which the voter applies to vote. The voter must not be a resident of the precinct or township, but he is entitled to vote if his name has been placed on the club roll at least five days before the primary. It often happens that a man living some distance from the court house, but expects to be at the court house the day of the primary, has his name enrolled on one of the town clubs so that he will not lose his vote. This is legal and we mention it because we have heard that a party living in Summerton was told he would have to vote at Panama because he lived in Friendship township. The gentleman giving this information could not have been posted on the rules. A party who resides at Manning can vote in Summerton if his name is on the Summerton club roll five days before the primary.

Do not be Deceived!
There is a shrewd game being played in order to win votes for candidates who are representing prohibition in this campaign. The candidate will be approached and informed that "Appelt brought out his opponent." For instance we have heard that Mr. Turbeville has been told that "Appelt brought out Dr. Woods," and Dr. Woods has been told that "Appelt brought out Mr. Turbeville." Then both of these candidates and others have been told that "Appelt brought out Mr. Galluchat," etc.
Of course the use of these reports is to get up a feeling of resentment among the candidates in order to create confusion in the ranks of those who are opposed to the "prohibition-dispensary" game now being played by certain politicians. We have too much faith in the good sense of the people to believe that they will be twisted from their purpose by such foolish reports. The people are not as easily fooled as some of our political brethren think, and when they come among them a man preaching this new fangled "prohibition-dispensary" idea cloaked in the garb of religion they will look beneath that cloak to see if there is not hidden a political deceiver.
Now we want it distinctly understood that Louis Appelt, editor of THE TIMES, is not responsible for any man's candidacy for any office; that he has sincerely and honestly assisted the people of Clarendon do not elect any man to the lower branch of the Legislature whose political and personal hatred is so intense that the feeling will be carried into the General Assembly and thereby cause the people at home to the sufferers. Louis Appelt does not mean to dictate, and all such talk is unbecoming for the purpose of prejudicing voters, but he does not mean to say that if Clarendon county wants a delegation in the Legislature to be of service to the county, the people should elect men who have no political or personal revenge to gratify. Louis Appelt has endeavored to be a faithful public servant; he has never tried to keep from the public any of his denials, acts, and when the Legislature was in session he gave them a full account of what the Clarendon delegation was doing. If as Senator there was any act of his which did not meet with the people's approval he was made acquainted with it until within the opening of the present campaign, and only then, by some who differ with him on the liquor question and who would like to be elected to the Legislature.

Louis Appelt is not a candidate for office in this primary and the people should not be fooled by the professions of men whose hearts are green with malice against him. It is easy enough for a man to juggle with figures before a crowd, because the crowd, as a rule, will not take the trouble to verify the candidate's statement, but when you go to the tax office to pay your taxes the truth will come out that the taxes are one mill less this year than they were last, and one-fourth of a mill less than when Louis Appelt was sworn in as Senator; and further, when Louis Appelt was sworn in as Senator, the assessed valuation of property had been reduced nearly \$100,000 and the county was about \$75,000 in debt. Today the county is out of debt with a surplus in the treasury and the tax levy reduced one mill less than last year.

The County Campaign.
The county campaign meeting opened last Monday at Pinewood. Mr. J. R. Griffin presided and he made a model chairman. He would not allow the candidates to indulge in mud-slinging and the result was that everything passed off pleasantly. Dr. I. M. Woods, a candidate for legislative honors, was prevented from attending owing to illness of his brother-in-law, Mr. John McFadden. Mr. J. Elbert Davis, a candidate for sheriff, was also absent on account of being prostrated at his home with fever.
The candidates for the Legislature defined their positions. Messrs. Richardson, Jones, Turbeville and Galluchat were opposed to prohibition. Rev. T. B. Owen was for prohibition "pure and simple," and Captain D. J. Bradham said, "I do not want to discuss the question, but I want the profit feature, and this miserable 'fess X' removed."
After the meeting was announced adjourned Senator Appelt was called on for a speech and he responded.
The crowd was not large, but representative, and if there is any indication of how people are going to vote by the way they talk, that section is surely against this so-called prohibition, and is very strongly in favor of the dispensary. It was clearly demonstrated to the writer that the people are going to vote against any man who does not represent their views on the liquor question, notwithstanding the fact that in the person of Captain Bradham the prohibitionists have a good talker and one who has heretofore been a successful politician; and in the person of Rev. T. B. Owen they have another good talker whose persuasive powers might better be put to teaching people how to pray and not how to vote.

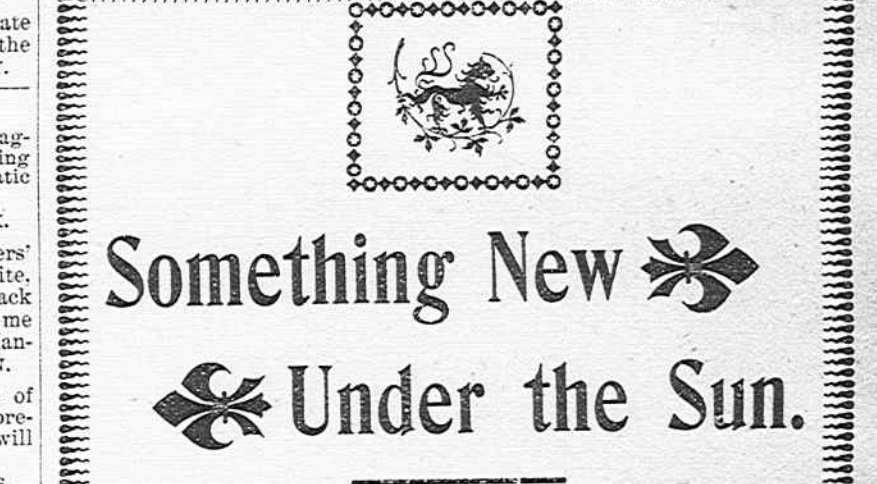
