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County Commissioners Meet.

The County Commissioners met last Saturday. The newly appointed members presented their commissions and were duly installed. The board is now composed of T. C. Owens, W. J. Turbeville and L. T. Fischer. By invitation the legislative delegation composed of Senator Louis Appelt, Representative H. B. Richardson, Dr. L. M. Woods and M. V. Galluchat attended the meeting. The early part of the morning, the board was engaged in approving claims, and listening to applications for aid. Mr. C. R. Pollock, the former clerk, was present during a portion of the meeting, and on retiring stated that he had not been informed of a change on the board, but wished the new board a successful administration. Representatives Richardson and Woods disclaimed having been consulted with regard to any change, but they had no objection and approved the appointment of the board.

Owing to the fact that the Treasurer's report was not due until the 15th, the board could not give the delegation accurate information with regard to the receipts and disbursements for the year 1900, but as soon as the report is made, the delegation will be supplied with the necessary information. It was estimated that the expenses for the past year was about \$13,500 and the receipts about \$15,000. Supervisor Owens was requested to send his statement such suggestions as the board thought proper to make. The board then considered applications for the clerkship, which resulted in the election of Mr. J. H. Lesene, the former clerk being otherwise employed was not an applicant.

The matter of county printing was then taken up, and the board awarded the contract to THE MANNING TIMES for \$225, the price paid for several years, although the work will be considerably more. There was another bid presented for \$150. The board is not required to ask for bids, and they did not do so in this matter. They will advise their best business judgment, and in the exercise of that judgment they took into consideration the amount of work to be done, its character, and the efficiency of those asking for it. THE MANNING TIMES having done this work very satisfactorily for many years, at a very reasonable charge, they concluded to continue the contract with that paper.

We know that capital will be made out of this transaction, but we are satisfied that the people will sustain the action of the board when we tell them that after years of experience we know the price to be paid is much less than the regular charge, and an offer to do the work for less could only result in a loss which business men do not make unless there is some purpose.

Death of Dr. Baer. Dr. H. Baer, of Charleston, died suddenly last Wednesday night and as the executor of his will is a young man formerly a resident of Manning, but for many years the confidential clerk of the deceased, the following will be of interest: The will of Dr. Herman Baer, signed April 4, 1893, was filed for probate in the office of Judge of Probate H. L. P. Bolger yesterday morning. Mr. Louis Levine was named as sole executor of the estate, with a provision that Capt. W. A. Cook was to be substituted as executor in the event of Mr. Levine's death before the death of Dr. Baer. Mr. Levine was duly qualified. The drug establishment, over which Dr. Baer presided with such great success, will according to his own instructions, be continued for two years, and matters of detail regarding the conduct of the business were mentioned in the will. The property of the deceased was left to his family, one-fifth being bequeathed to his wife and the remaining four-fifths to his children. He bequeathed all of his French and German books and bound volumes of magazines to the trustees of Wofford College for use in the Wofford College library. The magazines consisted of bound volumes of Harper's, Atlantic Monthly, the Eclectic Magazine, Scribner's and the Century Magazine. Some of these magazines extend back over a long period and will be valuable to the college library, and the French and German books collected during Dr. Baer's lifetime will be of inestimable value to the College.
