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LET THE PEOPLE DECIDE.

Col. James A. Hoyt, editor and proprietor of the Greenville Mountaineer, who was defeated for the office of governor in the last primary, thinks it a piece of belated news what we said about the State committee, out of respect for Colonel Hoyt, "stretched" the oath required by the party rules to fit Colonel Hoyt's case that he might be admitted" etc. Perhaps we were mistaken about the committee stretching the oath required by the party rules, we remember now it did not, but the committee when asked to decide whether a man who had been nominated by a faction, either publicly or privately suggested, could under the rules of the party participate in the primary, they evaded the question by saying in effect, the rules of the party prohibited factional nominations and they disapproved of such nominations, but, if a candidate filed a pledge saying that he was not the candidate of a faction he would be permitted to run. Colonel Hoyt is among the number wanting to dictate who shall be permitted to run in the coming primary, and the only way he and his kind can work such a trick, is to manufacture a pledge different from the one in use. In the last primary the rules required a pledge which was, that the candidate taking it, swore he was not the candidate of a faction either publicly or privately suggested, and Colonel Hoyt filed such a pledge, and became a candidate in the primary after having been nominated in a convention, of which he was a member expecting the nomination, judging from the address he pulled out of his pocket after his nomination, and read before the convention.

The point we want to impress is, that one of the very men now clamoring to keep others out of the primary by fixing the rules and pledge to suit their cases, did not let the party pledge stand in his way when he was a candidate. The committee out of respect for Colonel Hoyt, for all of them like him as a man, would not make a positive declaration as they should have, nor did they stretch the oath; the mistake we made was saying the committee "stretched the oath" probably we would have been more accurate had we said the candidate stretched his conscience when he took the oath required by the party rules.

Colonel Hoyt denies that he is indebted to the committee for the privilege of entering the campaign of 1900. "He was there because he was entitled to the privilege as a Democrat, and he did not ask permission of the executive committee, nor would he do so under any circumstances." We do not dispute this at all, Colonel Hoyt had the right to participate in the Democratic primary so long as he obeyed the rules governing the primary, no one disputes the proposition that Colonel Hoyt is a Democrat, but when the party constitution or rules stamps out factionalism by requiring a pledge, to entitle a candidate to run in the primary, setting forth that he has not been nominated or suggested by a faction, and the fact is, that a public convention was held and put forward a nominee, we cannot to this day see how such nominee could take the party pledge without having first refused the convention made nomination.

But this is threshing over old straw, the party did permit Col. Hoyt to run notwithstanding he was nominated by an organized faction in a public convention, and we believe some people voted against him for the reason that they could not see how he could take the party pledge under the circumstances.

Now, Col. Hoyt and Mr. Gonzales, editors of the Mountaineer and the State, respectively, want the State convention to adopt a platform and a pledge which some Democrats cannot take, and they know it. These editors do not want the primary free and open to any white man who will swear that he is not the candidate of a faction either publicly or privately suggested, and will abide the result and support the nominees, which is the pledge of the party now, and has been ever since the convention undertook to stamp out factionalism in 1894.

Mr. Gonzales is the able editor of the Columbia State and is the man who was largely instrumental in putting forward the Haskell movement in 1890, and who fought the holding of a constitutional convention, gave aid with able editorials to the element that carried our suffrage and registration laws to the courts and who supported Samps Pope for Governor. He of all

men should not have an influence in the shaping of our party affairs, for he has been an enemy to the Democratic organization of this State since 1890.
 Colonel Hoyt has not been in accord with the majority since 1890, although he did not go as far in his opposition as did Mr. Gonzales, but since the last primary he and Gonzales have been making a strong fight to exclude from the primaries those whose views do not coincide with theirs. We are not ready to submit our Democracy for approval to a man who has fought our State Democratic organization with such bitterness, as to encourage those endeavoring to break down white supremacy, nor to a man who is nominated in a factional convention and signs a pledge that he was not.

What we do want is the right every white man should be entitled to, and that is, the right to submit our views to the white people of this State for their decision with our solemn pledge to abide the consequences of such decision. Nothing short of this will satisfy a free people and if the Gonzales and Hoyt idea prevails in the convention, then our primary system is doomed to destruction, a hope we believe is devoutly wished for by a certain element in this State. We want the people and not the bolters or disappointed politicians to be the judges of our Democracy.

MORGAN ON McLAURIN—THE VIEWS OF A STATESMAN.

The greatest Southern statesman is conceded the country over to be John T. Morgan of Alabama. It was this intellectual giant and great exponent of Democratic principles who, while making his fight in the United States Senate for measures, regardless of which party introduced them, brought down upon his head the bitterest of opposition. The politicians raised the cry of treachery and the newspapers joined the chase to hound Morgan down, that through prejudice, abuse, misrepresentation and vilification they could bring about his downfall with the people. Morgan remained at his post in Washington without a word while the politicians were enjoying their conspiracy against him unobstructed. When the primaries came off Governor Johnson took the field against Morgan and notwithstanding Johnson had all of the court house officials together with hundreds of appointees, and nearly all of the newspapers to help him, and besides, for months the people had their minds filled with charges of "Republicanism" against Morgan, the result was that Johnson failed to carry a single county in the State not excepting his home county, and Morgan was returned to the United States Senate a stronger man with the people than ever before. Here is what he says about John L. McLauren, with reference to the Tillman-McLauren controversy:

"Both men are good Democrats. I have no reason to doubt either man, and I consider Senator McLauren one of the ablest men in the Senate. He is young, he is modest; but he is very able. I cannot think of one instance where McLauren and his Democracy challenged. One may vote for or against subsidies—but all Democrats in the Senate vote for a subsidy at one time or another in one way or another—and still be a true Democrat. I consider the man who disregarding the faces each and every public question as it comes up and tries to solve it for himself. Yet, we have our stereotyped Democrats. There is an opportunity to honor the man who, disregarding both the platform and the nominees of his party, does not step over into the ranks of the other party; but prefers to let the issue pass—takes to seclusion and waits; but does not desert his party. I think there are many such Democrats in this country today, and we shall not misjudge them. Therefore, no one can say that this man is not a good Democrat, or that man is not because he may vote for or against subsidies, etc., all disappear or in the lower house which may appear to involve directly the Democratic or Republican principles.

"I voted for the treaty of Paris not because Mr. Bryan was on hand working for it; but because I thought it my duty; I talked and argued against the ship subsidy bill because I thought it outrageous and an imposition; but as I spoke against it the Cotton Growers' association of the south passed a resolution favoring it. That shows there is a diversity of views on this question in the south as well as in the north. I do not think that Senator McLauren's Democracy can be safely challenged.

ARGUMENT IS NEEDED.

We think now the people will have some rest from the annoyance of political sensations; at least for the present, for we are sure the politicians are convinced that to continue with their starting sensations, bodes no good to them when the people get tired. During the year there will be discussions of the several important questions now before the National Congress, but these will be conducted in a manner to educate the masses, they will be free from heat or personalities, and only in response to invitations. Wherever a community desires to hear an address on the "living issue" and they will address an invitation to any of the gentlemen who are informed, we have no doubt but the invitation would be accepted and the people entertained to an address that would give them much information. This, to our mind is the proper way to have these great questions discussed; there is no use for a speaker trying to enlighten the masses when his arguments are covered by the

dust that is kicked up in a personal controversy, and the way joint debates are conducted these days argument has no place, the man who can say the hardest things whether relevant or not gets the applause and comes off victorious. The people do not have time to make a close study of these great political problems, and must depend largely upon their public servants for enlightenment, and it is but fair to them, that all questions of public moment should be presented to them free from complications, personal animosities, and heat. The arguments should be entirely on their merits, for the people do not care what one man thinks of another man, especially politicians, what they want to know, is, what is the question to be considered, and who makes the most reasoning argument.

It is an impossibility to test the merits of a question when the discussion of it, is made up principally of charges and counter charges, and whenever such is the case the affair becomes a word-slugging match for the purpose of deceiving rather than enlightening.

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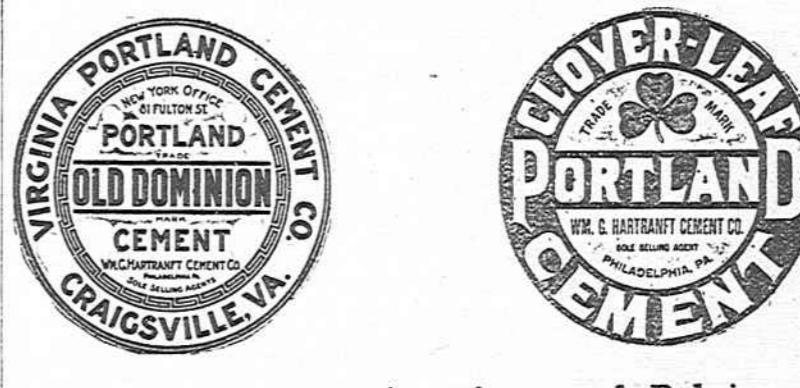

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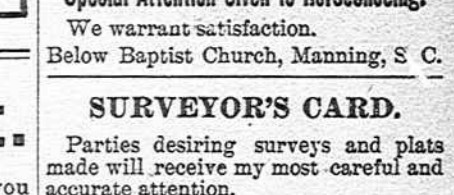
