the trackless ocean? England and other foreign nations pay a subsidy to their great navigation lines and the natural result is that a large part of the trade of the United States is now carried on in foreign bottoms, and as the countries controlling those vessels are our business rivals, it is natural that they should work against our interests.

Our Southern cotton farmers have justly complained that the price of their staple is fixed is Liverpool, and whose interest it is to buy our staple as low as possible. Now, just so long as we must depend on English and other foreign vessels to transport our cotton, our farmers will remain at the mercy of those foreign buyers.

I have never seen that ship subsidy bill, and it may have all the objectionable features that it's opponents claim for it. 
