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The BEST METHOD OF FRYING FOOD.

Some Valuable Suggestions and How to Get Satisfactory Results. No Need of Having Dyspepsia.

Most physicians, especially in the northern United States, say that fried food is responsible for most of the dyspepsia, especially in the south, where frying is most prevalent.

This is no doubt true, in a broad and average way, but it is not necessary that it should be true. Too much grease or fat in the frying pan is certainly bad for the digestion; but the conclusion must not be too hastily reached that fried food is necessarily greasy. Grease for cooking should be looked upon merely as a medium for communicating a high degree of heat.

It is not usually possible to cook things in a water to a higher temperature than 212 degrees, and hence in many cases it is necessary to cook meats, etc., at the higher temperature to which they are subjected. But it is easily possible to cook things equally well done in grease in a much shorter time, on account of the higher temperature to which they are subjected.

Frying is generally a most wasteful manner of cooking, for the reason that so much of the grease is thrown away or absorbed by the food. This is generally unnecessary. If the frying has been properly done, the grease has not taken up the very best of the food. The frying pan into a vessel of hot water, when most of the foreign matter has been removed, and the water will float after somewhat washing itself in the water. It may then be used again and again with the best results.

There is naturally a small amount of frying grease. In Europe, where many kinds of grease and oils are used for frying, people become accustomed to it. In this country all are accustomed to the smell of frying hog lard. When it was first proposed to cook with cotton oil the new smell was objectionable, especially the smell of badly refined oil, and thus there grew a prejudice against the use of cotton oil. The fact that often times the cook would not wait for the oil to get hot enough before putting it in the articles. When using lard, the cook would naturally wait for it to melt, and it would get hot without being subjected to the oil that looks ready when it is first put in the frying pan, and there is a temptation to use it too soon.
