Preston Booker Wells, as a token of esteem from friends in Manning S. C. 1902." Fastened to the handle with white satin ribbons was a roll of parchment containing the names of the contributors. Mr. Wells in accepting this testimonial of confidence from his friends, not members of his church, was naturally grateful and much affected. He made a beautiful speech, paid a glowing tribute to the people of this community, referred to his stay in Manning, and the treatment he received, and now on the eve of his departure for another field this expression from his friends, would always linger in his memory. Mr. Appel to express his thanks to the kind friends for the beautiful token.

Mr. Wells' talk was touching, many in the audience were deeply affected, and the tribute paid to their beloved pastor, was very gratifying to the members of the congregation. Mr. Wells has been living in Manning four years and under the rules of his church he can remain no longer, his friends, who are legion in this community, desiring to manifest their esteem for him, conceived the idea, to present him with something which would be useful, and which could be handed down to his children as an heir-loom—they ordered through Mr. S. The presentation was made on Sunday in his church, because the donors wished it to be made in the presence of his flock, and because it was appropriate to make the presentation to the man while he was standing at his post of duty.
