MR. THURMOND'S ARGUMENT. Solicitor J. W. Thurmond followed for the State and began his argument by bringing to the attention of the Court what was necessary for the granting of a change of venue. Why do they ask for this change?

First. Because there are only 1,300 white jurors out of 4,000 voters. This certainly should not be sufficient grounds for the change.

WHAT IT COSTS TO MARRY.

Only a Five Dollar Bill to Necessary to Defray the Expenses in Most Places

Marriage is one of the cheapest of luxuries if one reckons only the outlay required for the payment of the preacher or magistrate who performs the ceremony and the cost of the license in such states as require licenses. Any minister, priest or preacher of the empize marriages, and in many states judges for one or more classes of courts may officiate. In all save halt a dozen states, too, justices of the peace have the privilege of officiating at the highly important function, says the Chicago Chronicie. In some parts of the United States

the person performing a marriage cer-

emony must have personal knowledge of the identity, names and residence of the parties, and inasmuch as such laws are enforced in some of the western states where young people frequently drive long distances to be married, the stipulation has on occasion caused more or less inconvenience. In most of the states two witnesses are reuired to be present at the solemnization of a marriage, although in some states a single witness is sufficient. There is still in force in Pennsylvania an old law which prescribes that 12 witnesses shall be present, but this exaction is seldom if ever enforced. Perhaps the strangest stipulation of all is that which appears in the laws of Tennessee, and is to the effect that the validity of a marriage shall be in nobaptismal name of either party in the license and the use of a nickname instead, provided the parties can be idenified. Any person conversant with the conditions prevailing in the mourain districts of Tennessee will appre ciste the wisdom of this unique pre-

Common supposition is to the effect that the fee for performing the marriage ceremony is dependent entirely upon the generosity of the bridegroom, and it will, doubtless, therefore, surprise many persons to learn that in several states the law has a hand in the matter. In the Old Dominion, for instance, there is a statute which prorides that the person solemnizing a marriage is entitled to a fee of one dollar, and that "any person exacting a greater fee shall forfeit to the party aggrieved \$50." In West Virginia it is stipulated that the fee be "at least one dollar," and the Idaho law says that "the fee shall be five dollars, or any other or greater sum voluntarily given by the parties to such marriage.' In 16 states of the union a wedded couple may obtain a more or less elaborate certificate of their marriage

A ROMANTIC CAREER

Speculator and Husband of Duchesa Ende Up as a Marine.

D. L. Dwyer, Former Chicago Million zire, Anxious to Secure His Release from the Navy in Order

to Begin Life Over Again.

Edward L. Dwyer, once a millionaire mine owner, promoter and bold speculator in wheat, who startled even Chicago by his daring, and who later married a duchess worth millions of dollars, sailed into the Brooklyn navy yard the other day a marine on the United States transport Calgoa. Dressed in his natty sailor suit, his face bronzed by the Philippine sun, his muscles hardened by work. Dwyer looked little like a dashing speculator and husband of a duchess.

Dwver has been in the service of the United States since July 31, 1900, when penniless, disinherited by his aged wife, tired of wandering, he went to Harrisburg and enlisted in the marine corps. The term of enlistment is three years, but Dwyer has influences at work in the pavy department, and there is little doubt that his early discharge will be secured.

Dwver first attracted attention in 1880, then a member of the Chicago board of trade, by purchasing 1,000,000 bushels of wheat for future delivery without depositing margins. While in New York 1894, representing western mining interests, he met the Duchess de Castelluccia, whose husband had died only a short while beat \$7,000,000. She was more than 40 wars elder than Dwver, but he won her, and the two were married at Rock Ridge, Fla , January 29, 1895.

The duchess died soon after the wedding, leaving the bulk of her fortune. to her two children. Dwyer received 510,000.

Dwyer then started on the read to financial ruin through speculation. and in May, 1800, he found himself penniless He filed a petition in bankruptcy in New York, with liabilities of \$252,055 and no visible assets. But Dwyer within a year had organized a company with a capital of \$1,500,000 to develop silver mines in Zacatecas. Mexico. Apparently this scheme was not successful, and a year later he was again penniless. It was then that he enlisted and was assigned to service in the Philippines.

While Dwyer was in the Philippines he looked about him for favorable investments and he thinks enterprise there will open the way to fortune. It is said that the bronzed marine will go back to the islands immediately upon receiving his discharge.

REMAINS OF MONSTER BIRD. Valuable Discovery Made in Southern Part of Argentine Republic-Larger Than the Dodo.

Brief information of the discovery in Patagonia, or rather, of the southern part of the Argentine Republic. of part of the remains of an extinct bird that, in size, outrivals any of the forms known to science, either living or extinct, has just reached the chief ornithologist of the Smithsonian institution, who regards the discovery as one of the first importance. The size of this extinct bird, which the discoverers named the "phorarachis," is, according to the reports, something amazing, it having been at least a fourth larger than the "dodo" of Madagascar, a bird now extinct, but which until the finding of this Patagonian monster held first place for size in the list of birds living and extinct.
