



CASTORIA. The Kind You Have Always Bought Bears the Signature of  Teachers' Examination. The regular fall examination for teachers will be held at the court house in Manning on Friday, September 18. The examination will begin at 9 o'clock a. m. and close at 4 o'clock p. m. The following is the law regarding qualifications: SECTION 12. That after February, beginning in May, 1903, there shall be Two County examinations for teachers' certificates each year, to be held in May and September. That hereafter no teacher shall be employed in the public schools of this State who has not registered his certificate in the office of the County Superintendent of Education and submitted proof thereof to the Board of Trustees employing him.
