Dr. Danca's Address.

Following is a synopsis of the address of Dr. J. A. Danca, delivered at the Teachers' Association April 23, 1904:

Teaching of today occupies a higher position than it has ever done. Teaching and the priestly function were formerly found in one man, sometimes including that of the medicine man. All ailments were from evil spirits; the priests were the conservers of all knowledge. They only knew reading and writing. "Hieroglyphics" meant priest-writing. Now preachers and teachers begin to divide and doctors too. The clergyman is no higher than the teacher. Nothing is higher. Your calling is just as holy. We make a mistake if we regard our own calling anything less than the highest. All of us are recalled to the gospel. The man behind the counter, the policeman in the shop or school, all are called to preach and to work together to disseminate truth. The work of the teacher is great. There are different methods of teaching. I learned a great deal out of school. I had no teachers until in college, never saw a teacher until grown, tho' born in the heart of a city, Richmond, Va. Yet I say frankly I never saw a teacher till then—only hearers of lessons. I answered a great deal in the book. It was much like a phonograph cylinder. We learned isolated facts, by rote, as the little child learned the catechism. When asked "What is the chief end of man?" she replied, "To glorify God and man." I am glad to see we are getting some teachers—some imparters of knowledge. This is the school day. Only recently a man has given \$1,000.00 for a school of journalism. A few years ago a young man, the pleasure could be a Y. M. C. A. secretary, but now he must have training for this. Life insurance requires a course of study really. At Harvard University last year there were lectures on insurance. This is the day of training as of old, as never before. Teachers now must be more than mere graduates for best results for themselves or for their pupils.

Let me say something as to this. Here is the child to be taught. Don't make the mistake that the child is to be taught to read and write. What? Its own language and how to communicate this language. All things can be done for the child and it may not know anything. I know where there are 150 young ladies not 15—although they come from public schools—speak grammatically. What is the matter? They read, they know books, grammar and can write good compositions, understand subjects and principles. They haven't been taught grammar. Are we teaching them to speak correctly? We ought to burn some books. Now don't misunderstand me. I was brought up in a college, afterwards teaching and learning from other people. I love books and my own library and I love to read and study. But I believe it would be profitable to burn some books and do without them. How? Here comes a child and you ask "what did you do this morning?" and she replies "I ain't done nothing." There is a chance for your grammar. Get rid of "ain't" done nothing." Two common mistakes here among us are "come" and "was." Don't say anything about grammar. Teach how to talk by talking—learn by doing. I don't care about theories. Grammar is the crystallization of language. It came after language and is not the foundation.

Is history the remembering of dates? This is important oftentimes but the great thing is the correlation of events. Take the Revolutionary war, the Civil war, the war of 1812, the Mexican war—they must be connected. As a great statesman once said "If you have no States slave States and others free States, you will have trouble." As to how to teach dates, each teacher has an individual method. A successful teacher used this plan for teaching history of 100 years: a large square and brains can produce and are offering them at reasonable prices. There would be no material advantage to any comrade in the assembling of the comrades, but raise false hopes in the breast of those needy comrades whose expenses were borne by some members of the camp and outside friends, but on the occasion of the last reunion it was made manifest that this outside natural and proper assistance had failed them, for with the exception of Capt.
