Now is the time for our business men to begin to look about them to induce our farmers to bring their cotton and tobacco to this market. Last season we gained a reputation which this season if stand up in good stead this season if some of our money is invested will be those to their interests. The merchants should begin correspondence with cotton exporters and manufacturers with a view to having upon this market active buyers. No market can induce products unless the competition has such an activity as to force prices. Farmers work hard for what they make, and because of the active competition last year our market was greatly benefited.

An organization has been effected to afford facilities for people of moderate means to own homes, by purchasing property and paying for it on a rental basis. This organization is known as The Manning Building and Loan Association. The initial meeting took place last Thursday evening at the Bank of Clarendon; stockholders representing a majority of the shares subscribed were present. The following directors were elected: J. A. Weinberg, E. S. Ervin, F. O. Richardson, J. W. Rigby and Louis Appel. As a meeting of the directors the next morning J. W. Rigby was elected President, Louis Appel Vice President and J. A. Weinberg Solicitor. The election of Secretary and Treasurer was postponed until Monday in order to give the directors an opportunity to consider applications. At the Monday meeting Miss Hattie G. Nelson was elected secretary and treasurer.

The executive has been called to gether by the county chairman, and at this meeting there should be something done towards getting the club rolls in some kind of decent shape. There should be a definite rule adopted for bidding the placing of names upon club rolls between the first and second primaries. There should not be the suspicion of fraud, and the committee can, if it will, adopt rules which will prevent fraud. We suggest that a resolution be passed, requiring all clubs in the county to file with the chairman a copy of their rolls by a certain date, then when these rolls are in his hands let the committee go over them with care, and whenever they find a name upon more than one roll strike it from all except the one nearest to the home of the voter. In the town clubs where they find names duplicated strike them off all but one. Then after this course has been pursued, the committee can employ a typewriter and return to the respective clubs a revised roll certified to by the county chairman; this certified roll to be the guide for the managers in the primary. We merely hoping the committee will be enabled to improve upon them, that our political machinery will not continue with the label of suspicion. Everybody admits there is something radically wrong, the only question is a remedy and if an earnest effort is made by the committee the remedy will be found.

Manning Has a Public Cotton Weigher.

At the regular meeting of the Board of County Commissioners last Saturday Mr. J. S. Plowden presented a petition signed by more than fifty cotton growers living within five miles of this place, asking the board to adopt the public cotton weighing system for the market and to elect a weigher. The statute is clear and leaves the commissioners with no discretion when the law has been complied with, and for that reason the commissioners did not comply with a request made to defer action until a counter petition was gotten up. Mr. Plowden not only had a petition for the establishment of a weigher, but accompanying it was a very strong recommendation for his selection as the weigher. The commissioners after satisfying themselves about the law, granted the petition and elected Mr. Plowden weigher.

There has been considerable clamor for a public cotton weigher in Manning for several seasons, and it will be given a trial this season. Whether it will work satisfactory remains to be seen, but of one thing we are certain, the commissioners in selecting Mr. Plowden for the weigher gave the position into the hands of a man who will perform his duty conscientiously.
