Whereas, the great demand for man ufactured goods at prices satisfactory to the manufacturers, who paid at from 10 cents cotton would only be commeasurate with the demand.

Therefore; we, the farmers, merchants and bankers, and cotton holders of Clarendon County, South Carolina, in convention now assembled. Resolved, 1. That we refuse to sell any more cotton for anything less than 10 cents per pound middling basis.

2. In order to prevent an over pro-duction of cotton for the year 1905, that we will curtail our cotton acreage and guano bills 25 per cent. under last

year's crop.
3. That we will endeavor to enlist the merchants and bankers to co-operate with us in the curtailing of the crop acreage and fertilizer bills by refusing to advance the amount required,
