Governor Heyward has appointed as a board of expert examiners to investigate the case of Ned Mack, the condemned negro in our county jail, who was to have been executed March 23rd, and after the Governor's attention was called to the possibility of a doubt as to Mack's sanity, in the interest of justice Mack was respited, and Dr. J. W. Babcock, Superintendent of the State Hospital for the Insane; Doctors Mood and Baker, of Sumter, and Doctors Geiger and Brockington, of Manning, were appointed a commission as medical experts to examine into the sanity of Mack. These gentlemen made their examination yesterday, and the fate of Ned Mack depends upon their report to the Governor.

The Real Shillalah. The shillalah, accounted Ireland's national weapon of defense, was originally a common blackthorn stick, but in modern times it has been replaced by the more wiry ash sapling. The real shillalah is a young shoot of the sloe shrub or blackthorn pulled by the root from the crevice of some rock. After being trimmed it is placed in the smoke of turf peat, which softens the harder end, and when it has reached a condition as pliant as rubber it is straightened. When cooled in the air it becomes as strong and firm as iron. The trimming process is then continued, and when it is desired to make a particularly handsome weapon the spurs, so effective in a melee or faction fight, are ornamented with small brass nails.

The Murder Case in Valdosta. Valdosta, April 1.—The commitment hearing of A. L. Frierson, charged with the murder of J. E. Flood, sometime ago, and Mrs. J. E. Flood, according to the killing, was held here this afternoon before Judge Griffith, of the City Court. The main witness was little John Flood, stepson of the murdered man, who saw the tragedy. Frierson was bound over to answer for murder, and Mrs. Flood held as accessory after the fact. Her bond was fixed at \$1,000. A number of witnesses were sworn, and a large crowd attended the preliminary hearing.
