McLaurin an invitation to be present, just as he did to Presidents Jordan and Smith. Mr. Archer, however, who is known to have a personal dislike for McLaurin, was determined to prevent McLaurin's speaking, and in doing so on the plea of keeping the association out of politics, injected the meanest kind of politics into the meeting by adjourning the meeting without giving the secretary an opportunity to make an announcment or explanation. We believe such tactics as Mr. Archer displayed will act as a boomerang, and that the decent people of Spartanburg will stand for no such treatment. Mr. Archer not only attempted to bridle McLaurin but he tried to work a similar game on Messrs. Hyatt and Weston, but these two were more fortunate than McLaurin, because they got their speeches in before the dinner was announced.


