Newton's Telescope. Newton fashioned a concave mirror from a mixture of copper and tin, which gives a surface with almost the luster of silver. An image of the star was produced in the focus of this mirror, and then this image when examined by a magnifying eyepiece permits the astronomer to study the star at what is equivalent to a greatly reduced distance.
