The editor of the Christian Advocate was in Clarendon the day after the election, perhaps he can give to his readers the information.

The entire reference to Clarendon's election published in the Advocate is a balled up mess of inaccuracies.

The dispensary in Clarendon County to whom did the Supervisor admit "that a high official in that county influenced him not to publish the notice?"

It would be surprising indeed to the people of Clarendon County to learn that they have elected a man to one of the most important of offices who is nothing but a puppet to be handled at the will of some "high official."

The Supervisor did not give the notice required by law for the election he called, and we believe, if contested, the courts would have forced a strict compliance with the Act, this being a special election, but we do not believe the Supervisor intentionally slipped over the

time. Besides, we have as much confidence in the honesty of the Supervisor, as we have in the editor's. The Supervisor's office was in the office of a very active Prohibitionist, his clerk was an active Prohibitionist, his Attorney was a very active Prohibitionist, the petition was in the custody of the Clerk, and when the Supervisor reached the conclusion that a sufficient number of signatures had been obtained to call the election he called upon his attorney to draft the order for the same, and it was this attorney who discovered the time required was "thirty days." The Supervisor did not know the law until his attorney told him. But some suspiciously inclined may say, "it was his business to know the law," but while that may be true, the fact of his not knowing does not make him the culpable wretch the Christian Advocate would paint him. The active leaders on the Prohibition side know and will say that the Supervisor did no intentional wrong. He made an honest mistake as to the exact number of days of notice that was required only.
