 Mr. and Mrs. C. R. Harvin, Jr., now living in Georgia, are in Manning visiting their parents.
 The Breckington picnicers were out bright and early Monday morning, making their way to the Mecca for fun.
 It is to be hoped that council will remove the policeman's shanty from in front of the court house square.
 The election held for bonding school district No. 20, resulted in favor of the bond issue by a vote of 38 to 24. Close vote.
 The farce comedy given in the auditorium last Thursday night for the Clarendon hospital fund, was a financial success.
 Last Monday the national holiday was observed in Manning by the suspension of business, picnicing and frolics generally.
 There will be preaching at Fellowship church next Sunday afternoon at 4 o'clock by Rev. C. W. Blanchard. Public cordially invited.
 The friends of Mr. J. W. McLeod, will be gratified to learn that he continues to improve, and the probability is he will soon be home again.
 Mr. and Mrs. P. B. Thames returned home from Hot Springs, N. C., last Friday evening. Mr. Thames' health improved considerably by the springs.
 THE TIMES editor, accompanied by his daughters, Misses Mattie, Augusta and Valrie, left yesterday to attend the meeting of the State Press Association in Greenville.
 The merchant who patronizes other towns to get his advertising matter, does not deserve the same consideration from the trading public as the merchant who patronizes home.
 Mattie Curtis, the infant daughter of Mr. and Mrs. T. F. Coffey, died at 5 o'clock this morning, after a brief illness from gastro-enteritis, aged 11 months.

 Slowly but surely the Clarendon hospital enterprise is gaining ground. Seventy-three dollars and sixteen cents have been added to the fund from the proceeds of the entertainment last Thursday night.
 On account of the picnic of the Clarendon Baptist Sunday school Thursday, the lecture by pastor Blanchard will be deferred until next Thursday night. There will be no services at the Clarendon church tomorrow night.
 We have given our editorial space over to the publication of a sermon by Rev. C. W. Blanchard, which will entertain our readers better than anything we may be able to write at this time.
 The Manning base ball team left last Friday for Georgetown to play a series of games, and to dip in the surf of Pawley's Island Sunday. They went down famously to defeat in three games. Manning stays in the Charleston class.
 The oil mill at this place has been purchased from the Independent Oil Company, and the management proposes to add a fertilizer manufacturing plant to it. This means a saving of money to those buying fertilizers, and more money saved at home.
 There is absolutely no truth in the reported eloquence said to have taken place from Manning last Monday. The rumor had its foundation only because two persons were marriage eligibles and happened to go off on the same train.
 Rev. A. R. Woodson is anxious to have every member of his church present on next Sunday to join in celebrating the 40th anniversary of the birth of Jno. Calvin. All Presbyterians in reach of Manning especially invited and others who desire to be present at the celebration.
 Captain Thomas Wilson, wife and daughters, and his son Dr. E. R. Wilson, took passage last Saturday on the Anchor Line at New York for Glasgow Scotland. They expect to arrive returning to their home in Sumner, Bon voyage.

The true prospect for Manning is not excellent anywhere because there is an awakening here, and a determination to make this town the true center of the county. The town of Clarendon should come to the county seat to do their buying, it is to their interest to do so, and our merchants are doing all in their power to demonstrate that Manning is the equal of any other market.
 Married last Wednesday evening by Rev. C. W. Blanchard, pastor Clarendon Baptist church, at the home of the bride's mother, Mr. Perry M. Farrow, Sumter and Miss Malvina Walker, daughter of Mrs. M. E. Walker. The couple took the train for Asheville and other points in North Carolina amid the throwing of rice from a crowd of friends who went to the depot to see them off.
 In about one month there will be an election in the counties having dispensaries, and we predict the result to be the closing up of over eighty-two of the two hundred and thirty-two when the legislature convenes there will be a general prohibition law enacted. We also predict that Charleston will be one of the prohibition counties. Let us wait and see. We know it to be a fact that there is a general sentiment in Charleston to close the county dispensaries and it will take a hard fight in that city to save them. Therefore let us urge every reader of THE TIMES to form him or herself into a committee to urge a large attendance here on the 14th.

There will be a prohibition rally and basket picnic at Fellowship church Grove on the 14th, under the auspices of the Manning, Jordan and Bethlehem local unions of the W. C. T. U., to which the public is cordially invited. The Rev. C. E. Burtis, D. D., of Edgefield, president of the Anti-Saloon League of South Carolina, will be the chief orator of the occasion. It is promised that this picnic will be "dry" in only one sense of the word. Those who have heard Dr. Burtis testify that there is nothing "dry" about his address. We hope, to have some good singing and there will be ice water for all. Ice cream and lemonade will be on the grounds for sale, so don't leave your purses in your "other pants" pockets!
