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An Ordinance

An Ordinance providing for the sanitary arrangement of all privies or water closets in the Town of Manning, and providing a penalty for non-compliance.

Be It Ordained, By the Mayor and Aldermen of the Town Council of Manning in council assembled and by authority of the same.

SEC. II. All persons are hereby directed to immediately proceed with making such above named arrangement, in order that same may be done on or before the fifth day of April, A. D. 1911.

SEC. III. Any person or persons who shall fail to have their respective privies or water closets arranged in accordance with the specifications of this Ordinance by April fifteenth, 1911, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in the sum of not less than Two Dollars, nor more than Ten Dollars, or be imprisoned for a period of not less than two days, nor more than ten days.

SEC. IV. Any person or persons who shall fail to have their respective privies or water closets arranged in accordance with the specifications of this Ordinance by April fifteenth, 1911, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in the sum of not less than Two Dollars, nor more than Ten Dollars, or be imprisoned for a period of not less than two days, nor more than ten days.
