That every person, firm, company or corporation engaged in any trade, bus ness or profession hereinafter mentioned with in the limits of the town of Manning shall be required on or before the 15th day of January. 1912 to obtain a license to exercise said trade business or profession within the limits of the said town; and every person, firm or corpora tien now now so engaged, but expecting to en gage in such trade, business or profession afte the 1st day of January of the present year, shall be required to first obtain license to exercise same, all of the said license to be fixed accord ing to the schedule and amounts hereinafter
