Hundreds of Others. It is hard to say where the 142,000 the voted in the primary election on Tuesday came from. Ac cording to the census of 1890 the white population of South Carolina was 452,008. Estimating one white voter for five persons, the usual rate, the white voting population in 1890 abould have been 92,401. Estimating that the rate of increase was 2.2 per cent. a year, approximately the rate of gain between 1900 and 1910, the white voting population in 1892 the year of the contest between Tillman and Sheppard, was 96,266. The number of votes cast was 87,500.

By the census of 1900 the white population of the State was 557,807 and the white voting population on the basis of one in five was 111,561. Allowing 2.2 increase for the last the voting population is now 141,809. Estimating 34 scattering boxes not reported, the total vote alleged to have been cast last Tnesday was 142,104. In other words the State is supposed to have polled 295 more ballots than there are presumed to be white men of voting age in the State.

Allowing again 2.2 per cent. annual increase the vote to have been expected this year was 11,919. Extraordinary interest might possibly have accounted for a vote between that figure and 120,000.

In no State primary does every man qualifed cast his ballot. In 1892 candidates, when the proportion was usual. higher than in any other year until per cent. of the white Democrats did not vote. Ten per cent, not voting would reduce the vote of 1912 to have been far more than ten per cent of the voting population.

Who in a primary do not vote? A physician said that one-half of one per cent are usually sick in bed or have bereavements in their familles on any day in the year. So 700

We do not know the number o white Republicans and Socialists in the State but 3,000 would not be an extravagant estimate.

The white insane males and imbeciles number several hundred. There are some hundred white convicts. There are another hundred or more men in the jails and station houses on election day.

Granting that the number of the indifferent in the State and absentees from the State was less than usual this year, their numbers always aggregate some thousands. Any man who will think a moment can bring to mind friends or acquaintances who were in New York, North Carolina or elsewhere on election

There are always a number of men whose business engagements are too pressing to allow them to vote. There are others who live in places remote from the polls and there are aged men and cripples who can not con-

veniently reach the polling places. Perhaps two thousand have changed their residences immediately before the primary or have not lived in the State a year.

A still larger class who do not vote are those who neglect or through mistake fail to have their names enrolled five days before the primary Who does not remember an acquaint ance who failed to be enrolled? Sometimes, through mistake or the loss of books a club may have its en-

Washington, Aug. 24, 1912.
