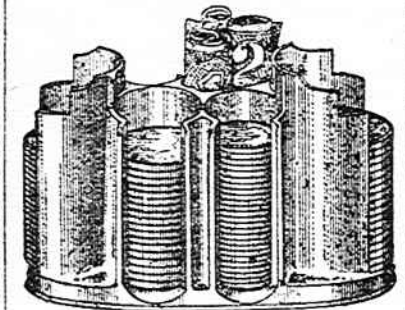
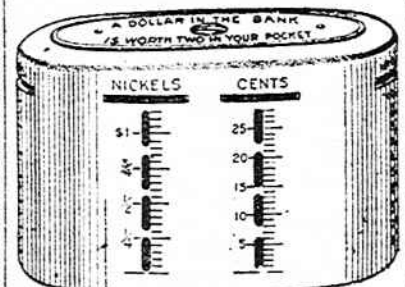


**His Prized Meerschaum.**

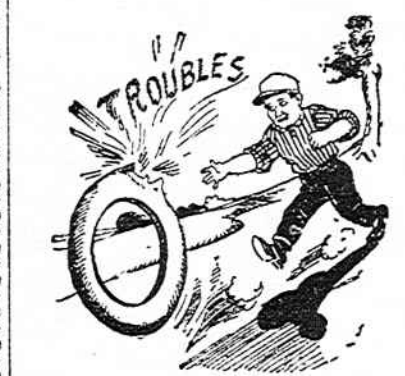

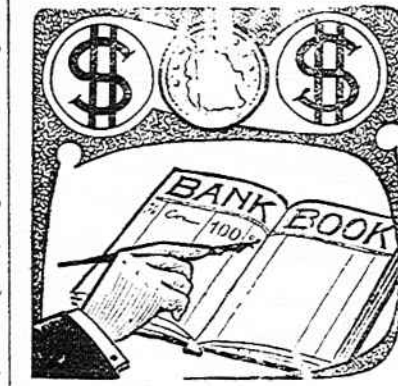

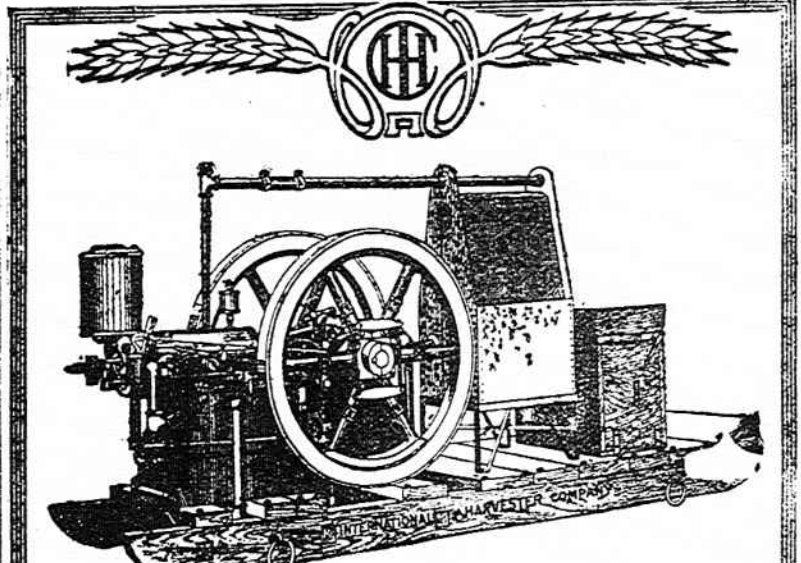
