At Rest.

Died Monday morning about 4 o'clock Mr. Winfield Scott Harvin, aged near 50 years. Mr. Harvin had been in ill health for a number of years.

The deceased had been married twice, his first wife was Miss Lela LeGrand and the children of this marriage surviving are Lucius H., Dr. Arthur of Abbeville, Dr. W. Scott, Jake R., a student at the Charleston college; Mrs. S. A. Harvin of Sumter, Mrs. C. S. Rigby and Susan. His second wife was Miss Amanda Thomas of Charleston and by this union there are surviving Stephen Thomas and Joseph Bates.

Mr. Harvin was one of Manning's most prominent citizens. He served this town as Intendant and warden a number of times, was thoroughly identified with the town's progress, and was largely instrumental in putting forth enterprises, in fact he did more along this line than any other man in the town.

Mr. Harvin was born and reared in the Presbyterian church and he took a lively interest in its welfare, was an officer in it and gave it his personal aid. He was a man ready to give aid to a good cause, and although regarded as peculiar in some things of minor importance, whenever it was shown to him that he could really render a service, either for the welfare of the town or to an individual who was worthy, he could always be depended upon.

When the court house proposition was contemplated Mr. Harvin had to be persuaded to serve as a member of the commission, but once he gave his promise he felt that his personal reputation was at stake, and he gave up much of his busy time to the enterprise, and many of his ideas are incorporated in this handsome structure.

The pall bearers were his four sons, Lucius, Arthur, Scott and Jake and his two sons-in-law S. A. Harvin and C. S. Rigby. The honorary pall bearers were J. McD. McFaddin, Dr. C. B. Geiger, A. L. Lessece, T. F. Coffey, Joseph Sprott, W. C. Davis, Charlton DuRant and A. I. Barron.

The floral tributes were many and beautiful. As a mark of respect the entire business of the town was suspended from 11 o'clock until after the funeral.

Cornerstone Laying.

Ebenezer Baptist church (colored) Ebenezer S. C. organized 1872, built 1901, rebuilt 1912. Jas. P. Garrick, pastor.

The present pastor has been serving for a period of eight years. He is a young man, yet the church has seen its most prosperous years during his administration.

For the past two months this church has been enlarged and beautified on a very modern style with two beautiful towers on the front, a beautiful gallery an elevated floor for the choir back of the pews with very tasteful appointments.

The masons also surprised the pastor and his people by giving them a purse of more than \$20.00 to help them in their effort. This building has been remodelled at a cost of approximately \$8000 and indeed does much credit to the town of Manning.

There is Money to be Raised. The preachers, elders and deacons of Harmony Presbytery had a rally last Monday night in the Masonic hall for the purpose of starting a canvass to raise \$25,000 towards the fund of \$200,000 the Presbyterians are trying to raise for their several educational institutions.

The rally was well attended, although not as large as other places came as was expected, nevertheless there were about 75 persons present, the ladies of the local church prepared a supper for the guests, and after having finished well speeches were made by President Wainwright of the Columbia Theological Seminary, President Bryd of Chicago College, President Douglas of the College at Clinton, Rev. A. C. Bridgeman gave out the subscription cards with an address relating to the details of the canvass.

Next Sunday special sermons will be preached in all of the churches of the Presbytery in the interest of raising this money, and the canvass begins immediately after the sermons.
