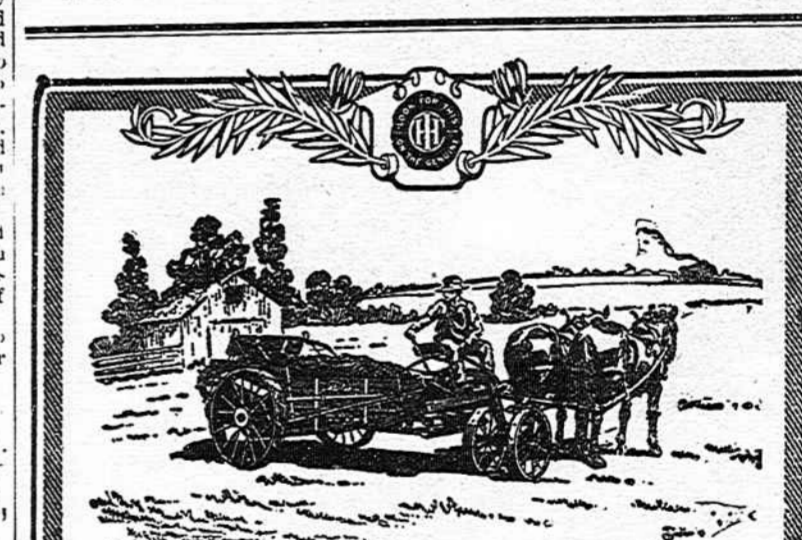


SOLICITOR JOHN H. PEURIFOY.

Mr. Peurifoy advocates the establishment of more Federal experiment stations in the South, and especially in the First Congressional District, and by this method he would seek to bring to the farmers of this section the same aid which has been given by the National Government to the farmers of the West. He would recommend that the Government send an expert to each county in the District to study soil and climate conditions in order that seeds might be suggested, and would further recommend that a liberal supply of the best seeds be furnished the farmers.

While drainage is of prime importance to this District, and while Mr. Peurifoy would endeavor to promote it, yet it should not be forgotten that a wider development is possible for the dry lands which we already have.

Mr. Peurifoy favors further aid from the Government in the building of roads and would work with this end in view. He is the logical man for the office, and on account of his experience, character, and ability, is best qualified to represent all the people.
