CONFEDERATES HOLD REUNION
Chatanooga Making Elaborate Preparations

Something of the Arrangements to Care for the Confederate Veterans—Big Attendance Expected.
 Chatanooga, Tenn., April 1.—This city is preparing to entertain the largest crowd that has attended a reunion of the Confederate veterans and Sons of Veterans since the organization of the association. It is a matter of history that the first steps toward organizing the southern survivors of the Civil war were taken in Chattanooga. The New Orleans meeting, at which the organization was effected, followed by the election of Gen. John B. Gordon as commander-in-chief, resulted, in large measure, from agitation started here by Capt. J. F. Shipp, and others, for an association of Confederates. The New Orleans meeting elected Gen. John B. Gordon to head the organization and he called the first reunion of the association for Chattanooga July 3, 4 and 5, 1890. Under all of the circumstances the people of Chattanooga feel that it is their duty to exert every effort to make the coming reunion a brilliant success. It is certainly their pleasure to do so.

The date of the reunion is May 27-29 inclusive. Only two months remain in which the work of the organization may be done, but it is well under way. The various committees have been appointed, and are at work in their respective spheres. Information gathered from all sections of the south indicates that fully 150,000 people will be here.

The passenger departments of all the railroads having lines entering Chattanooga, report that already there is much interest in the coming reunion. Inquiries are received every day about rates, hotel accommodations and the program of the work incident to the entertainment of the veterans and the thousands of visitors that will be here. The head of the passenger department of one of the largest railway systems in the south, has served notice on the people of Chattanooga that a record breaking crowd may be expected.

The Confederate veterans met here in their first reunion in 1890, twenty-three years ago. Chattanooga at that time was but poorly prepared to care for the visitors. Hotel accommodations were inferior, local transportation facilities poor and the people were suffering financially from a collapsed boom. However, that reunion was voted a success.

The Chattanooga of today was built since 1890. It is now a city of 100,000 with the best of hotel accommodations and first-class local transportation facilities. It has twenty-six hotels, one of them a modern, twelve-story building costing a million dollars. The boarding house accommodations are all that are to be found in a modern city of 100,000 people. The hotels, boarding houses and private families will furnish entertainment for 150,000 visitors. The restaurant service is first class and adequate to any demand.

The Confederate veterans will be camped at Jackson park, a delightful resort almost within the business districts of the city. This camp has been named "Camp Stewart," in honor of the late Gen. A. P. Stewart, the much beloved and noted southern chieftain, Robert Lee's lieutenant, who won fame on the greatest battlefields of the Civil war and spent his declining years in Chattanooga as a member of the Chickamauga National Park commission. The motion to name the camp for him was put by Mayor T. C. Thompson, and was unanimously adopted.

Chatanooga is putting great energy into the preparation for the reunion, and every indication is that it will be one of the most delightful meetings the veterans have ever enjoyed.

The environments of Chattanooga are ideal for a reunion of the Confederate veterans. The battlefields are the chief points of interest, of course, but they are not all by any means. Chattanooga is a modern city of 100,000 population, with a greater number of manufacturing plants than any city in the southern states, turning out more than seven hundred different products that go practically all over the world. It has a number of skyscrapers, and other modern buildings. The climate is ideal. The mountain scenery is not excelled in any other section of the south. Some years ago Prince Henry, of Prussia, spent a day in Chattanooga and made a trip to the top of historic Lookout mountain. After viewing the panorama from that eminence, he exclaimed: "There is nothing finer in all Europe." Every tourist who has travelled in European countries passes the same eulogy on these mountains. The Confederate veterans, however, know what they are. Thousands of them fought over this field, and it will be a pleasure to them to revisit the scenes of the carnage through which they passed in 1863.

For the purpose of entertaining the reunion on a broad scale, Chattanooga is raising from \$50,000 to \$75,000. This fund is practically in hand, and the various committees are rapidly closing up all contracts and rushing the preparations to conclusion.

The Southeastern Passenger association has granted a rate of one cent a mile each way for the reunion—the lowest rate that is ever allowed for any cause.

FROZE A SOAP BUBBLE.
 Then Broke it in Pieces and Floated Them on Liquid Air.

A frozen soap bubble broken in two and floating like an iridescent, transparent eggshell on the surface of a vessel of liquid air was one of the marvels exhibited by Professor Dewar in a lecture before the Royal Institute of Great Britain.

The lecture was upon the subject of atmosphere and the curious effects of intense cold. The liquid air and soap bubble being adjuncts introduced to facilitate some explanations.

A few spoonfuls of liquid air were poured into a vessel and the intense cold caused by evaporation immediately brought on a miniature storm in the atmosphere directly above the vessel. A soap bubble was then placed in the freezing stratum. Almost instantly there was a change in the color of the transparent globe, the bubble becoming much darker; the movements of the rainbows film grew slower; it contracted somewhat in size, and a little later it froze.

A slight but dexterous movement of the rod upon which the bubble was suspended broke the latter into two pieces, which fell upon the liquid air and there floated for an hour, gradually accumulating a tiny snowdrift from the almost imperceptible precipitation constantly going on in the freezing atmosphere above.

STEVENSON'S GRAVE.
 Its Romantic Site, in Samoa, Atop the Forest Clad Vaila.

No English novelist reads in a more eccentric spot than that chosen by Robert Louis Stevenson, who is buried on the summit of the forest clad Vaila, in the island of Samoa, that rental spot in the south Pacific that the gifted writer loved so well.

The day after his death at Vailima, in 1894, his remains were carried to the top of this precipitous and picturesque peak by sixty sturdy Samoans, who had loved and now mourned their dear chief, Tusiuta.

A party of forty had previously cut a pathway through the thick, tangled wood with knives and axes, while another party had prepared the grave. With infinite care and trouble they bore him shoulder high over the rough ground to his last long home, and there, under the starry sky, they left him to sleep forever, with the Pacific at his feet.

On either side of his tombstone is a bronze plate. One bears the words "The Tomb of Tusiuta," while the other is inscribed with his own requiem, beginning:

Under the wide and starry sky
 Dig the grave and let me lie.
