RIDING THE SURF. Riotous Sport in the Breakers That Lash the Coast of Hawaii. "One of the novel pleasures in which tourists indulge while in Honolulu is surf riding at Waikiki, near Diamond Head," writes John Burroughs in the Century. "The sea, with a floor of lava and coral, is here shallow for a long distance out, and the surf comes in at intervals like a line of steeds cantering over a plain. We went out in our bathing suits in a long, heavy dugout, with a native oarsman in each end. "When several hundred yards from shore we saw on looking seaward the long, shining billows coming, whereupon our oarsmen headed the canoe toward shore and piled their paddles with the utmost vigor, uttering simultaneously a curious, excited cry. In a moment the breaker caught us and, in so many words, riding us on its crest, shot us toward the shore like an arrow. "The sensation is novel and thrilling. The foam flies; the waters leap about the foam. You are coasting on the sea, and you shoot with delight and pray for the sensation to continue. But it is quickly over. The hurrying breaker slips from under you and leaves you in the trough, while it goes foaming on the shore. Then you turn about and row out from shore again and wait for another chance to be shot toward the land on the foaming crest of a great Pacific wave."
