Political Thoughts

Editor The Manning Times: I did not bother you with an article last week. I thought maybe you would have so much news matter and so many editorial thoughts to give us that you would prefer using all your space yourself. I have been writing about the tariff, the income tax, Congress, etc., but I am coming nearer home this week and discuss some things that are nearer to us. I have been writing about the average South Carolina loved politics. This is true, I don't care what some folks say to the contrary. It is more than twelve months before the next election, and five or six candidates in the field, actively running for governor, and already the average voter has begun to discuss the candidates and to pick his choice, without even hearing what any of the candidates stand for, or announcing their platforms or views. In one respect all these candidates stand on the same platform, and that is the biggest plank in their platforms, to wit: that each fellow wants to be governor.

I noticed a short while ago that one of the candidates stand for, or announce in which he said that if the people would do so and, and if the people who had big tracts of land would not want so much for their lands, and if these lands were sold to the State, the State would have much the condition of the State would be improved, and so forth. But the candidate never intimated that he is a big land owner himself, never said anything about how to cut up these big plantations and get them owned and occupied by small, but progressive farmers. In fact he merely mentioned some unfortunate domestic conditions, and pictured how much better certain other domestic conditions would be, without offering or suggesting any remedy or plan to get things better. The whole thing is a mere bluff to get more votes. But I venture the voting people are going to think below the surface next summer.

By this time next summer South Carolina will be in the heat of another campaign, and the campaign parties will be going from county to county, and will be offering up new and better ideas of government. I do hope the masses of the people will do some thinking by next summer, and elect a governor who will recommend, and members of the legislature will do some measures of relief. You know the making of a few criminal laws is a small matter, and I sometimes wonder why so many members of the legislature will content themselves at trying to pass criminal laws, or some little school measure pertaining to some township in his county, without ever touching or giving thought to the larger questions which effect all the people. The biggest question before the people of our State, in my opinion, is this tax question. Nobody will deny that our taxes are high enough, and certainly no one will deny that our present system of taxation is cumbersome and does not work equitably upon the people. The law which is now in force here in the town of Manning pays 34 per cent taxes every year, counting state, county and municipal taxes, and then we have to pay a city license to do business besides. If you do not believe it, count it up for yourself. Under our present system, the man who is honest and conscientious in returning his property at its full value, or at even the supposed tax value, pays more than the man who is dishonest and who is not scrupulous to try to pay as little taxes as possible, and under-values his property by half, or even returns it at one-third or one-fourth its true value. The law which is now in force here in the town of Manning seems to be utterly impotent in their enforcement to make the tax dodger pay what he ought to. Now I could cite some specific instances to prove this, but I do not want to be personal. The only thing I can say is that I am saying in a year of peace like this, and when we have no politics, and everybody is working along making a living, it is a good time for people to think about a question like this. And if anybody is in a position to help in the running for the general assembly next summer, let him go to posting himself on our tax system and see if he cannot evolve a general tax law that will put property on the tax rolls in some proportion to its value, and will be upon all. Now I know that there are many difficulties which will have to be overcome, especially when the equalization among the various counties in the State tax question is considered, but it would be a vast improvement. It would take too much writing for me to even give an outline of some changes in our present tax laws which have suggested themselves to me, but I have some views.

I do not contemplate running for governor or for the legislature myself, and I will not consider myself a candidate for these offices, who are supposed to be reformers and advanced thinkers, to take up this tax question, and go to studying it. The greatest need that South Carolina has at this time is in the selection of a revision and remodel our present laws will be a statesman, and not only make a name for himself, but be the greatest benefactor to his people and his State. I am told that a few of our neighboring States here in the south have completely remodeled and improved their systems of tax assessment. It can be done. Why can't some of our legislators get broad enough and wise enough to do it in South Carolina. Of course, it will take some questions, and will take some study on the part of the man who tries it, to frame the bill, and then still more force to put it through, but it certainly is needed in South Carolina. I do not look for any practical suggestions on this matter from the various candidates for governor next summer, because that bunch is going to try to play first this political card for their benefit, and avoid this political rock which might work against them, so that the statesman who is in the field to be completely remodeled and improved their systems of tax assessment. It can be done. Why can't some of our legislators get broad enough and wise enough to do it in South Carolina.
