

Sheep should have a well-ventilated shed, high and dry. In dry weather to run out and in at will.

Nothing will feel or show neglect as quickly as sheep. Place the unthrifty ewes by themselves, and give them a little extra feed. Perhaps they are suffering from the greed of the bosses in the flock, and are not getting a full ration. Oats, wheat, bran, linseed meal and clover hay should be provided for cases. Dip the sheep shearing, and immediately e weeks to de-
