



### NETTLE CASE REVERSED.

A special to The Manning

Times from Oklahoma City says:

The committe on appeals of the general conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, today rendered a decision in the case of the Rev. S. A. Nettles of Spartanburg, S. C, reverseing the findings of the South Carolina annual conference at Rock Hill and declaring Mr. Nettles was not guilty of the charges preferred against him. Bishop James Atkins is chairman of the committee on appeals, and, by a rule of the conference adopted last week, the same committee that received the case fron South Carolina conference passed upon it. The committee found that the differences between Mr. Nettles and those opposing him were not irreconcilable and that Mr. Nettles should be exonerated.

The report of the committee was unanimous, although no reference to it was made in the conference. The committee is supreme in its verdicts and there is nothing for the conference to pass upon.

"Tne verdict of the committee on appeals meets the approval of every member of the South Carolina delegation," said Dr. J. O. Wilson, of Greenwood. "The committee was unanimous and I have no doubt that the matter has been definitely set at rest in our State. No arguments were made before the committee, the matter coming up from the annual conference in the form of briefs from the opposing sides.

Dr. Wilson announced tonight that the committee on conference boundaries had reached a decision in the matter affecting the South Carolina conference, upholding the memorial from the conterence that it be divided into two conferences. 1t probably will be a week more before the report gets before the general conference for consideration
