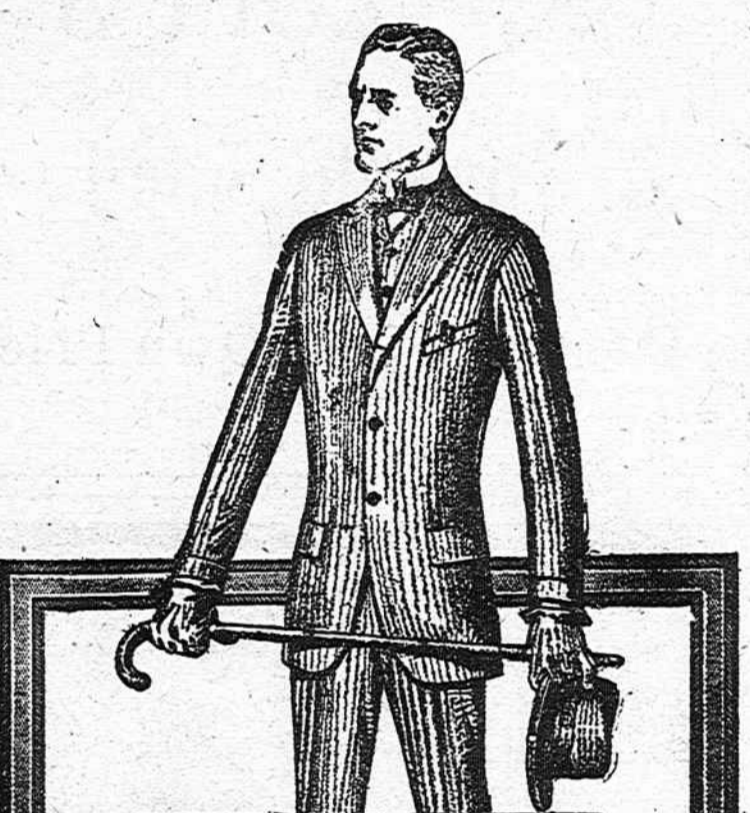

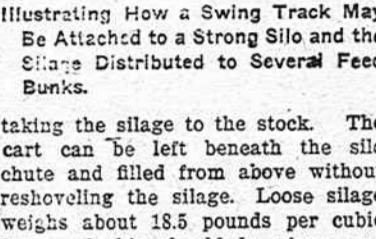

FOR REMOVING SILAGE Description of Devices in Use for That Purpose. Overhead Feed Carrier is Advisable Where Silo is Adjacent to Feed Yard—Much Depends on Number of Stock to Be Fed. (By L. W. CHASE.) From two to three inches of silage should be removed from the entire surface of the silo daily during the summer months and at least half of this amount in the winter. In the above-ground silos the silage may be dug loose with a silage fork and allowed to fall down through the chute to the ground, where it may be loaded into the cart or carriers and fed where desired; or it may be dropped directly into a cart, carrier, or wagon, and taken to the stock. If the silo is adjacent to the barn and there is a smooth way from silo to feed manger, a simple silage cart is the most convenient device for



Illustrating How a Swing Track May Be Attached to a Strong Silo and the Silage Distributed to Several Feed Bunks. taking the silage to the stock. The cart can be left beneath the silo chute and filled from above without reshoveling the silage. Loose silage weighs about 13.5 pounds per cubic foot, and this should be given consideration when building a cart for a definite capacity. More often than otherwise the silo stands either in or adjacent to the feed yard, in which case there is very seldom a smooth way from silo to bunks. An overhead feed carrier is then generally advisable. This depends upon the number of stock to be fed. Such a carrier may easily be arranged. If the yards are small a swing track may be attached to the silo and the silage distributed to several feed bunks. When several carloads of stock are being fed silage, the most convenient scheme is to throw the feed into a wagon and distribute it to the feed bunks with a team. Some sort of hoisting device should be used in pit and semipit silos. Where the pit is more than ten feet deep, hand hoists and power hoists are being used for this purpose. The simplest hoist is that of the bucket raised hand over hand, but this requires one person in the pit and another above ground. A better scheme and one which is practical where the silo is located in the barn between the mangers, is to obtain several baskets and equip them with stiff bails, then use them as follows: Fill the baskets and place them in the silo convenient for raising, climb out of the silo, and by means of a hook on a rope, hook a basket of silage to it and hoist it out. After the basket is emptied, drop it back into the silo, release the hook and hook another basket.

A homemade hoisting device for semipit silos and which can be adapted to pit silos as well, consists of a three-inch pipe carrying a wooden wheel and two drums. An old milk can filled with scrap iron is used as a counterweight. It should be slightly lighter than the weight of the cart and the silage. A horse-power hoisting device is easily used for silos entirely below ground. These silos have an opening in the roof through which silage is hoisted. The carrier is a box about four feet long by two feet wide, having a hinged bottom. The box is hoisted and pulled over to the dump chute by means of one horse. A trip rope allows the operator to dump the silage through the chute and return the carrier. An ordinary hayfork cable and carrier are used. This same arrangement may be used for feeding into several bunks.

Well-Fitting Collar. See that the collar is large enough, and fits properly to the shoulder of the horse. Sore neck is usually caused by a pinching of the collar. Never carry buckles or snaps on the harness in such a way that they may work under the collar and cause ugly sores.

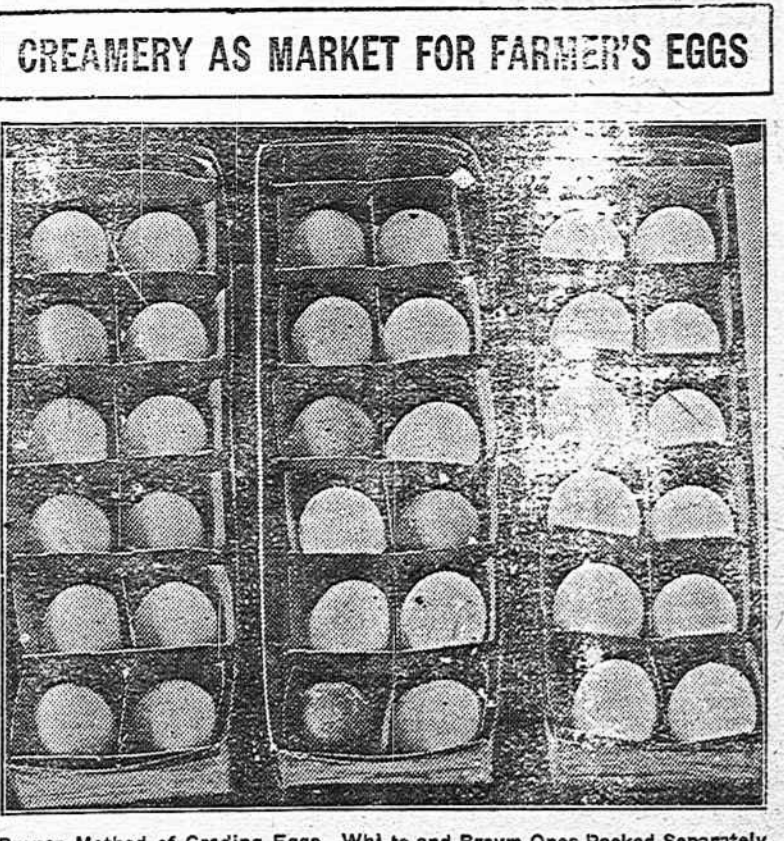

Proper Method of Grading Eggs—White and Brown Ones Packed Separately. (Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.) Because of the methods of handling and marketing eggs in common use among the general farmers who furnish the great bulk of the supply, it is not often that the producer can get the full benefit of the high prices for strictly fresh eggs during the fall and winter months. It is customary in many sections of the country for the farmer to take to town at irregular intervals a basket of eggs some of which may be clean and some dirty, some absolutely fresh and some distinctly below the highest grade. He is usually paid by number, not quality, and thus gets no additional profit from the eggs that are really first class. The village merchant, moreover, who takes these eggs is not usually in a position to make regular shipments to large markets. The result of all this is that before the eggs reach the ultimate consumer they have deteriorated to such an extent that they are not of a quality to command the highest prices. This waste can be, to a great extent at least, remedied by a system of marketing eggs through creameries. It is not necessary for the creamery to be a cooperative one, for even a privately owned establishment will naturally be desirous of adding to the prosperity of the neighborhood and to oblige as far as possible its patrons. For this reason it should content itself with a moderate profit on the eggs. This was the case with one privately owned creamery in the northern part of Minnesota, which may be taken as an excellent example of the possibilities of marketing eggs in this way. A short time ago about 135 farmers were selling their eggs through this agency. They were scattered over a wide territory, one man even driving 14 miles. Before the creamery commenced to market their eggs for them each farmer was required to sign the following agreement: "For the privilege of selling eggs to the creamery company and getting a market established for guaranteed fresh eggs, I, the undersigned, hereby pledge myself to comply in every way with the following rules: "I agree to deliver eggs at the creamery that will not be to exceed eight days old and to be picked in (gathered) twice every day. "Eggs to be of uniform size (no undersize or oversize eggs). "Eggs to be clean and to be kept in a cool, dry cellar. "Brown eggs to be put in one carton and white in another and so marked. "Each egg to be stamped on the side and carton to be stamped on the top. "I agree not to sell any eggs that I have marked with the creamery company's trademark to anyone else but the creamery company, and to return stamps and other supplies that have been furnished, in case I should decide to discontinue to sell eggs to the creamery company." Several points in this agreement are worthy of notice. In the first place, eight days may not seem sufficiently often in the majority of places to deliver the eggs, but the nights in Minnesota, even in summer, are usually cool, and this, together with the gathering twice a day and the storage in dry, cool cellars, was found sufficient to keep the eggs in good condition. It by no means follows, however, that this would be possible elsewhere. The brown and white eggs were separated because it was found that this added to the attractiveness of the packages, and, secondly, because it encouraged the keeping of hens which lay white eggs. During the spring months the owner of the creamery paid one cent more for white eggs than for brown on the ground that in the future he could obtain more for them in the market, and that he wished to stimulate the keeping of one class of chickens in order to insure a more uniform market. The stamping of the eggs is important. The stamp contained the name of the creamery, the creamery brand and a serial number for each producer. Thus, in case of any carelessness or failure to maintain the proper quality it was possible to trace the product back to the individual producer and lay the blame where it belonged. Each farmer was furnished with a supply of cartons each of which held one dozen eggs and were so shaped

that they could be packed in a regular 20-dozen egg case, and shipped from the creamery to market by express. The labor and cost of handling the eggs at the creamery were thus reduced to a minimum. They were never candied because the farmer was under obligations to bring in only good eggs, and failure to do so was regarded as sufficient ground for the creamery's refusing to handle the eggs of the offender in the future. In the particular case described, the eggs were shipped to a large grocery store in Duluth, Minn., which was already taking butter from the creamery. This store was able to sell the eggs to its customers for several cents a dozen more than the prevailing prices for other eggs. It is interesting to note, also, that the buyers became accustomed to the stamp on the eggs and when by accident two cases reached the store unstamped there was a little difficulty in disposing of them. The increased profit to the farmers through this method of marketing was not as noticeable during the spring, when eggs are plentiful, as when they were scarce. During the winter the difference was sometimes as great as ten cents a dozen, and when this particular creamery was visited one December the farmers were receiving 40 cents a dozen for their eggs. With the increased price the production rose rapidly also. Before the creamery took up the marketing of the eggs the supply received by the local storekeepers was hardly more than sufficient for the local demand. Later the creamery paid out in one year nearly \$4,000 to producers of eggs, nearly all of which were shipped away. This accounts for the fact that the local merchants, who were at first inclined to look with disfavour upon the innovation, soon saw that it increased returns to the community and meant increased profits to them eventually. There is no reason why a system similar to the one just described should not be adopted in many other localities. Local conditions will, of course, require certain changes, but the fundamental principle will remain. Fresh eggs shipped regularly in good condition to city markets are certain to earn greater profits for the producers than those which are allowed to deteriorate on the road from the farm to the consumer. Finally the profits from this egg business will make the establishment of a creamery possible when it could not be run for dairy products alone.

TO SPREAD OR PILE MANURE Answer to Question is Largely One of Location—Much Less Sustained by Broadcast Scattering. (By ALVIN KEYSER, Colorado Experiment Station.) The question frequently arises, Should manure be spread thinly over the land in winter when it is hauled, or should it be dumped in piles to be scattered in the spring? The answer to the question is largely one of location. In a great deal of Colorado territory the winters are dry, with dry, very windy springs. Where such conditions normally prevail scattering manure broadcast on the land during the winter means that the manure will dry out and frequently be blown away by the first heavy spring wind storm. Dropping in piles to be hand scattered later saves a part of this loss. Where snow is on the ground and where winds are not a menace, or where conditions permit digging the scattered manure into the top soil, this loss by blowing is prevented. From the standpoint of labor, dropping in piles increases the labor. From the standpoint of saving the manure it sometimes saves an appreciable percentage, while broadcast scattering would lose all of it. The farmer will have to decide these questions for himself in his own localities, based upon the points above enumerated.
