The Board through its agents is visiting penal and charitable institutions in the Pee Dee and Piedmont The assistant secretary of the Board went from Manning to Kingstree, Georgetown, Conway and Mar

With Sheriff Gamble the represen tative of the State Board Charities and Corrections inspected the county jail which was clean and had been repaint ed inside and calcimined about two months ago. In common with many other counties visited by agents of the State Board of Charities and Corrections, Clarendon has no adequate facil ities for caring for insane persons un-til they can be taken to the State Hospital for the insane lunatic, pending commitment to the State Hospital, are confined in one of the cells on the first floor of the jail. In the opinion of the representative of the Board, the counneeds another room added to the jail building as a place of confinement for lunatics. The walls of this room should be padded and its windows se-
