RUMANIANS YIELD TO TEUTONS BLOWS

VIOLENT FIGHTING CONTINUES TO MARK AUSTRO-GERMAN ATTACKS.

NO ACTION ON SOMME FRONT

The French Have Made Slight Gains at Salley and the British Have Taken German Trench Near Gueudecourt.

London.—Violent fighting continues to mark the Austro-German attempts to penetrate the Rumanian plains southeast of Kronstadt and Hermann-

stadt and toward Bucharest. The stiff defense of the Rumanians is yielding slowly to the blows of Austro-German artillery and infantry about Predeal, and Berlin announces further progress south of the border for them.

East of Predeal, however, the Rumanians advancing in the Buzou Valley have driven the invaders back over the frontier in the region of Table Butzi. They also have taken Mount Sirlu and Taturumio, along the Transylvanian border southeast of Kronstadt. South of Hermannstadt in the region of Rothenurm Pass, the Austro-Germans have extended their lines and captured an additional 350 prisoners. West of Bothenthurm and in the Prahova valley the Rumanians are holding their ground.

On the Eastern front fighting has taken place east of Kovel in Volhynia and southeast of Lemberg in Galicia. Berlin announces the repulse of seven Russian attacks against the Austro-German positions on the left bank of the Narayuvka River, near Hallez in Galicia, while Petrograd says the Russians have reoccupied part of their

trenches on the west bank of the Stokhod in region of Kiselln, in Volhynia. Near Lipnicadolna, in Galicia, the Russians have pushed back the Austro-Germans in some places.

There have been no heavy actions on the Somme front. The French have made slight gain at Salley and the British have taken a German trench east of Gueudecourt. Fort Vaux, in the Verdun region, has been occupied by the French, following its evacuation by the Germans.

SUBMARINE U-57 TO ACT AS CONVOY FOR DEUTSCHLAND.

Sister Ship of U-53, Which Sank Five Vessels Off New England Coast, Expected.

New London, Conn.—The German armored submarine U-57, sistership of the U-53, which recently sank five vessels off the New England coast, is expected to act as a convoy for the undersea freighter Deutschland on her return trip to Germany, according to a statement by Captain Paul Koenig. The Deutschland's skipper added:

"I would not be surprised if the armored submarine appeared off this coast while I am in port. You can't tell what the government will do."

The U-57, it was reported, left Bremen on October 13, three days after the Deutschland sailed.

In answer to questions Captain Koenig said he probably would make his homeward dash within the next 10 days. He denied a report that he would go through the Cape Cod Canal, saying nothing was to be gained by this route.

Officials of the Eastern Forwarding Company announced that the Deutschland's cargo was discharged. Great care was exercised to prevent outsiders from seeing the work. Only the crews were allowed in the hold. They passed the freight out to negro stevedores who stored it in the warehouses. Nothing has been made public concerning the Deutschland's manifest.

The citizens' committee which has arranged for a complimentary banquet to the Deutschland's crew next Wednesday, announced that a gold watch, suitably inscribed, will be presented to Captain Koenig.

Kill's Husband Accidentally.
Columbia.—Herbert M. Rowell, a locomotive engineer, was shot through the heart at his home here and died about 15 minutes later. The pistol, a 32-calibre Iver Johnson, loaded with steel jacketed bullets, was discharged accidentally. It is said, while Rowell and his wife were playfully struggling for its possession.

Cotton Mills Increase Wages.
Greenville.—The Laurens Cotton Mill of Laurens and the Poinsett Mill of Greenville have announced wage increases of 10 per cent for their employees. About 700 operatives are affected.

Newspaper Men May Build Co-Operative Factory—Hold Conference in Columbia.

McArthur of Sumter has been invited to appear before the association and outline his plans for the establishment of a paper mill in South Carolina. O. K. Williams of Rock Hill, J. L. Sims of Edgefield and W. J. Erwin of Chester were named as members of a committee to prepare a statement as to conditions. The price of paper has greatly increased in cost. It was brought out that manufacture of paper in Columbia. At an informal conference of newspaper editors and publishers held in Columbia, it was decided to call a meeting of the South Carolina Press Association at which the shortage of news print paper will be considered. The meeting will be held November 19 at 2 p. m., the place of meeting to be announced. The situation concerning news print paper is considered serious by the editors of the state and steps may be taken looking to relief.

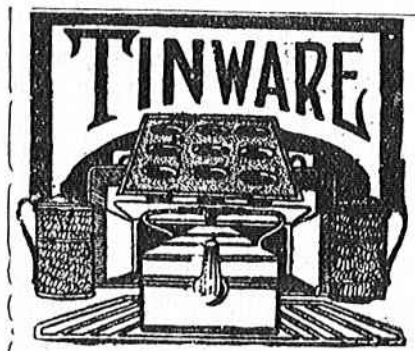
A committee was appointed at the conference to confer with officials of the Coker paper mills at Hartsville for as to the contracts from substantial customers.

The editors gave consideration to the organization of a co-operative paper manufacturing company to supply the papers of the state. The plan would cost about \$75,000, it was estimated and this amount, the proponents say, would be saved in two years.

R. C. Wright of Columbia told of his investigation into the paper situation. He said that the paper mills are unable to fill their orders.

It is probable that it will be necessary to increase the subscription rates of the county papers. A. B. Jordan, editor of the Dillon Herald, in a letter to the conference stated that it would be necessary for him to increase the price of his paper from \$1.50 a year. It may also be necessary to increase the advertising rates.
