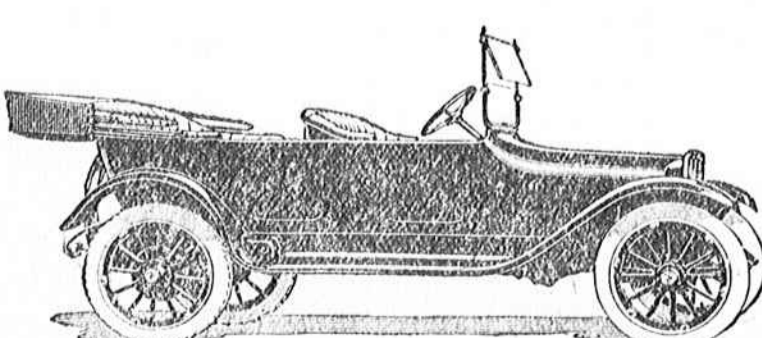

CHRISTMAS CLUB SAVES LARGE SUM

Bank of Columbia is to Pay Out \$85,000. NOTABLY SUCCESSFUL Plan Was Put Into Effect Only Twelve Months Ago—Pay in Cash.

Twelve months ago the Bank of Columbia opened for the first time its Christmas Savings club. At that time the success of the plan with this bank was so marked that it attracted a great deal of attention in banking circles in various parts of the United States. Charles N. Crewdson, the great advertising expert of Chicago, stated that the Bank of Columbia in opening so many new accounts for the first year in a city of this size, had broken all records for this country.

The club closed yesterday, the last payments being accepted at that time. The aggregate sum saved by the members is \$85,000.

The plan used by the Bank of Columbia is one which requires the clubs to be paid off in cash, the members having to present their pass books at the bank for payment. On account of the large number to be handled, it is necessary for the bank to extend the payments over several days, and just when an account may be withdrawn is shown in the advertisement of the bank.

The result of systematic savings is very clearly shown by the results obtained by the several banks in this city which operate Christmas savings clubs. If the habits thus acquired could be directed toward permanent savings, it would create in this city a very large fund which would be of material assistance in the development of the city as a whole, and for the benefit of each citizen thereof.—The State, Dec. 3, 1916.

Because of the great success of this saving plan in Columbia, Atlanta, Charleston, Florence, Spartanburg, Greenville and many other places the Home Bank and Trust Co., has introduced the same plan in Manning.

Great interest is being manifested in it and it should be as successful here as it has proven elsewhere.

Through the efforts of Fire Chief Higgins, all fire insurance rates have been reduced in Manning. On brick stores and contents the reduction is 20 cents per hundred, and on residences 10 cents per hundred. This reduction went into effect December the first.
