In the United States Court held in Charleston last week, the Lloyd brothers were tried for using the mail for fraudulent purposes. The ones charged were B. R. and J. B. Lloyd, of Columbia, W. D., C. L. alias J. C. and J. C. L., of Manning. All of these men were found guilty and sentenced as follows: J. B. Lloyd, 18 months in the Federal prison in Atlanta and cost; B. R. Lloyd six months in Richland jail and cost; W. D. and C. L. or J. C. or J. C. L. Lloyd, six months in Clarendon jail. L. C. Lloyd, another brother, who was supposed to have been implicated in the affair, was exonerated by the court. This case was very expensive as there were witnesses from different parts of the state, two from Chicago and one from New York to testify. Therefore, unless J. B. and B. R. Lloyd have the price of this case, which very likely was over \$1,000, they will have more time to serve.
