**FRENCHMEN SALUTE
STARS AND STRIPES**

Paris Celebrates United States Day in Commemoration of America Entering War.

GREAT DAY FOR OLD GLORY

American Flag Flies from Eiffel Tower—Ambassador Sharpe Makes Address.

Paris, April 22.—The Stars and Stripes were flung to the breeze from Eiffel Tower at 2 o'clock this afternoon and saluted by twenty-one guns. This marked the opening of the ceremonies of "United States Day" in Paris. The French tri-color and the Star Spangled Banner were at the hour unfurled together from the residence of William G. Sharp, the American ambassador, in the avenue d'Eylau, from the American embassy, from the city hall, and from other municipal government buildings.

Great Day for "Old Glory." It was a great day for the Red, White and Blue, forty thousand American flags being handed out gratis by the committee.

Jules Cambon, general secretary of the ministry of foreign affairs, Gen. du Bail, military governor of Paris, the members of the committee and others were received at 1:30 o'clock by Ambassador Sharp at his residence, whence they proceeded to the Place d'Iena, where a bronze palm tree was deposited at the foot of the equestrian statue of Washington.

Star Spangled Banner Sung. While cannon boomed in honor of the American colors floating from the top of Eiffel Tower and aviators, flying over the spot, waved both French and American flags, the Star Spangled Banner was sung by Mlle. Nina May, of the Opera Comique, and the Marseillaise, by Jean Note, of the opera.

Members of the American Lafayette Flying Corps, a delegation from the American ambulance at Neuilly, and the American field ambulances with a large representation from the Association of Veterans of the Marne, were the guard of honor before the Lafayette statue at the Tuileries Gardens, where the official procession halted to deposit a bronze palm.

Speech Making. Ambassador Sharp and his escort were received at 3 o'clock at the city hall. Adrien Mithouard, president of the Municipal Council of Paris, in a speech, welcomed Ambassador Sharp, who responded briefly, acknowledging the honors paid to the United States by the people of Paris. The speech was greeted with great applause, particularly when addressing the people of Paris, he said:

"Citizens of Paris: May I say to you on this holy day you have with such fine sentiment set apart to honor my country, that America remains no longer content to express to France merely her sympathy. In a cause which she believes, as verily as you believe, to be a sacred one, she will consecrate all her power and the blood of her patriotic sons if necessary, to achieve a victory that shall for all time to come insure the domination of right over wrong, freedom over oppression and the blessings of peace over the brutality of war."

A plaque representing "liberty enlightening the world," after the statue of Bartholdi, protected by the American Eagle, was presented to Ambassador Sharp as a memento of the occasion.

HOPE FOR SEPARATE PEACE

German Socialist Speeches Reported in Berlin Paper.

Copenhagen, April 22.—Via London.—Saturday's Berlin Vorwaerts, a copy of which has been received here, contains a detailed report of the speeches at the big Socialist conference showing plainly that the German majority Socialists, under the leader-

ship of Philipp Scheidemann, despite all denials, are working for a separate peace with Russia, if a general peace is not obtainable.

The resolutions adopted by the conference were framed with the definite intent to encourage the Russian radicals of the council of workmen's and soldiers' deputies in a peace parliament, Herr Scheidemann and the other leaders stating openly that citations from the Russian council's appeal had been inserted textually in the German resolutions to emphasize the fact that these were an answer to the appeal.

Herr Scheidemann in a speech also sharply condemned the Anglo-French Socialist and labor representatives for crossing the German plan by sending a mission to Petrograd.

"Naturally," said Herr Scheidemann, "our efforts are directed toward a general peace, but if they are unsuccessful, then, naturally, we are for a separate peace."

The Austrian Socialist leader, Herr Adler, said efforts should be directed toward establishing contact with "our friends among the enemy."

A national convention of the German Socialist party, which the leaders hitherto have refrained from convoking, owing to war conditions, probably will meet in the near future, because of the civil war between the factions.

The speeches at the conferences, which repeatedly touched on the strike movement in Berlin and elsewhere, brought out the interesting fact that militarism of the munitions industry was being contemplated in Germany. Several of the speakers argued that a continuance of the strike would more-

ly further the movement to put munition workers in private factories under military control, as in the case of the establishment.

Steamer Cut in Two.

New York, April 22.—The British steamer Burly Chine was almost cut in two and sunk in a collision today with the British freighter Harlem miles off Sandy Hook. The commander of the Burly Chine and his crew were rescued by the Harlem.

London, April 19.—The discovery of a new comet on Tuesday morning reported in a Reuter dispatch from Melbourne, Australia.
