The available supplies of foodstuffs are the lowest in all food-producing countries that they have been for over fifty years.

Prices of most foodstuffs have about doubled during the past two or three years.

The government crop report forecasts a wheat crop which will be short of American consumption.

The reserve supplies of meats are far below normal.

France, England, Belgium and Italy are short of food and are largely dependent on American imports, and, unless some means is found of supplying them, they can not continue to fight effectively.

The South is importing from the West and North \$600,000,000 to \$700,000,000 worth of foodstuffs annually and is thus a tremendous drain on the nation's food resources and, consequently, is now a menace to the nation's safety.

A pound of cotton at 20c will actually buy less foodstuffs now than normally.

**SUNDAY SCHOOL ASSOCIATION.**

Spartanburg, S. C., May 16, 1917. The Central Committee of the South Carolina Sunday School Association, composed of Rev. W. H. K. Pendleton, Chairman, H. L. Bomar, R. E. Boggs, S. T. Lanham, T. M. Lyles, of

this city, and M. F. Ansel, Greenville; Rev. W. I. Herbert, Greenwood; and Dr. F. M. Ellerbe, Jonesville, held an important meeting on Monday of this week.

At this meeting, plans were outlined for the work of the State Association during this convention year.

The Committee were unanimous in electing Miss Milwee Davis, of Laurens, as Rural Superintendent of the State Association. Miss Davis is peculiarly fitted for this work and will render the Sunday Schools of the state splendid service. Her special work will be with the rural Sunday schools, but she will be prepared to help in the general work of the District and County Conventions. Miss Davis will give practically all her time during the year to field and office work. She and the General Secretary, R. D. Webb, will attend the International Training School for Sunday School workers at Lake Geneva from July 1 to July 15. H. A. Wise, of Columbia, was reelected as Secondary Division Superintendent, and Paul Quattlebaum, of Conway, as Adult Division Superintendent.

It was voted by the Central Committee to adopt the self entertainment plan for the next State Convention. This action was taken in view of the fact that because of the size of the convention only a very few cities in the State can entertain it, and these few cities would have to entertain it too frequently under the present plan. The General Secretary was authorized to take up the matter with any cities that may wish to entertain the convention under the new plan.

The State Association, in connection with the International Association, will help to prompt "Patriotic Day" in South Carolina on Sunday, July 1. Plans for observing the day will be announced within a few weeks. "Come-to-Sunday School Day," which
